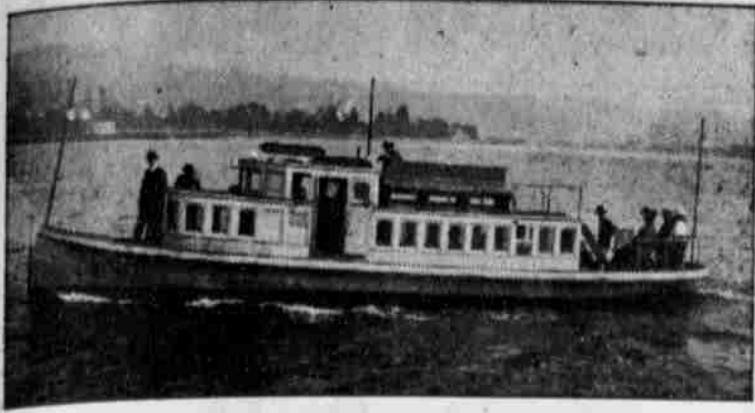


## Excursion to Charleston

## SOME CARNIVAL REFLECTIONS

MARSHFIELD, August 27th.  
After having taken ten days deep thought on the subject, and heard the various comments of our business men and our neighbors from the "great outside," the question again arises—was it a success in any particular? Well, let us see: Out on the water front, at the foot of Commercial street, near the "Queen's Rest," on Sunday morning, there sat an old timer basking in the early morning sun; the flies were a trifle bothersome this sunny Sunday morn, as was evidenced by the manner in which this same old timer twisted his face. There must have been something left over from Saturday night. A gentle gust of wind from the northeast stirred the confetti around his feet, but he heeded it not—not just then, for that breeze was a sort of balm to the fevered brow; he made a half experimental swipe at his face, not that he expected to get anything, but that he wished that big blue fly to know that he was still on earth. Another swish of that confetti-laden breeze took him across the brow and he straightened himself with the words, "just reflectin' just reflectin' das all." His fingers were all thumbs, but slowly one by one he searched his pockets, down deep in his left hand hip pocket he brought forth a small sized cut of saw-log.
