## DREDGE COMES TO BAY.

**J. E. Polhemus Writes Orvil Dodge Regarding It.**

The Coquille Valley Sentinel prints the following in regard to the dredge Oregon:

Much has been said in the papers of Coos county regarding the coming of the dredge Oregon to this county and as to which point she would do her first actual work. There have been statements made that the dredge was to come to Coquille first and that she was to come to Coos Bay first. No one seemed to have absolute information regarding the matter. In a letter to Orvil Dodge of Myrtle Point of recent date Major Polhemus states that the dredge will proceed to Coos Bay first and will then come to Coquille. Following is the letter:

Mr. Orvil Dodge, Myrtle Point, Or.  
 Dear Sir: I have just returned to the office from my vacation, and am glad to receive your letter of 18th inst. I understand that it is expected to bring the dredge Oregon from Gray's Harbor to Coos Bay at an early date, before the bad weather begins. I believe the plan is to use the Oregon first at Coos Bay in the construction of the inside dredging project which was only partially completed last season, and as soon as it is expedient to take her to the Coquille to do the dredging there as projected. Mr. Frederick Lefeve, from our office, is to have local charge of the works in your vicinity, and expects to visit your locality at an early date, and you will no doubt meet him. Very respectfully,

# KICKER ASKS QUESTIONS

Gets After the Fruit Inspector in a Series of Queries.

MARSHFIELD, Sept. 5, 1910. EDITOR OF THE TIMES,

Dear Sir: I noticed in your recent editions several paragraphs "Do You Know?" I would like to ask you one or two "Do You Knows."

Do you know that the county officials have appointed a fruit inspector to cover the entire county? Do you know that that fruit inspector has not been in Myrtle Point? Do you know that that fruit inspector has not been in Coquille? Do you know that that fruit inspector has not been in Bandon? Do you know that that fruit inspector has made his headquarters in Marshfield? Do you know that that fruit inspector could not possibly follow out the line that he has laid out for himself and take care of any more territory than Marshfield and North Bend? Do you know that if that fruit inspector had an opportunity to see all the fruit that is sold, that over three-quarters of the fruit sold in Marshfield from the local ranches would not pass inspection? We refer particularly to apples and pears. Do you know that there are thousands of bushels of pears and apples rotting on Coos River that the owners are afraid to ship in, that is equally as good with the stock that is being sold in the town? Do you know that the people of Marshfield are paying three times as much for Gravenstein apples as the people of Myrtle Point and Coquille? Do you know that the people of Marshfield will not be able to get enough pears to can this year on account of the inspection law? Do you know that Myrtle Point and Coquille are getting all the pears they want for 50 and 60 cents per box? Do you know that these same pears would not pass inspection if brought into Marshfield? Do you know that Marshfield is being made the goat and is paying the bill by being held up on the price of Gravenstein apples and pears? Do you think this is fair? Don't you think that if we are to have an inspection law that it should apply to the entire county and not to Coos Bay towns? Don't you know that inspection is a good thing, but class legislation is bad? Don't you know that we have a good inspector, but he is undertaking too much? Don't you know that Marshfield is easy when she stands for this? Don't you know I am a kicker, anyway?

## NEW YORK BIG CITY.

Has Population of 4,766,883 and is World's Second Largest.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Greater New York has a population of 4,766,883 under the thirteenth decennial census, according to figures issued by the Director of the Census. This makes New York the second largest city in the world, and as large as any two foreign cities, excepting London. Since 1900 the population of the metropolis has increased by 1,326,681, or 28.7 per cent as compared with 3,437,202 under the last census. New York City contains only 164,649 fewer people than the combined fourteen cities of more than 200,000, the population of which has already been announced, namely: Pittsburg, 8 Louis, Detroit, Buffalo, Cincinnati, Newark, Milwaukee, Washington, Indianapolis, Jersey City, Kansas City, Providence, St. Paul and Denver. The aggregate population of the cities named is given at 4,931,532. The city of New York, as constituted prior to the act of consolidation, effective January 1, 1898, had a population in 1890 of 1,515,301, as compared with 3,437,202 in 1900, showing an apparent increase of 1,921,901, or 126.8 per cent for the greater city.

# WILL MAKE AUTO ROUTE

Improvements Being Made on Road From Myrtle Point to Roseburg.

The stage road between Myrtle Point to Roseburg is being extensively improved and when the work is finished it will be a fine auto route. About \$30,000 was laid aside for this road alone this year. The Myrtle Point Enterprise gives the following about the road work:

Roadmaster Lee Weekly and his force of men are this week completing the work on the new grade around Sugarloaf Mountain on the Middle Fork. The grade from the old mill site to the Norton place has been so reduced that there is now no grade worth mentioning and the roadway that is not cut through rock is being surfaced with rock, so that it will be a great improvement over the old road. Hundreds of tons of rock and dirt have been moved in building the new road and Mr. Weekly has had a force of men working on that section the greater portion of the summer. J. L. Lewellen's automobile was the first vehicle to make the trip around the grade. The new road will not be in perfect condition until after it has been well packed after the winter rains have commenced. Other contracts are well along on this section of roadway that promise great improvement, though there are still a number of places that will need to be rocked before the road is good for winter travel. It has been suggested that the work could be continued through the winter and the rock applied at a time when it will pack as it is placed on the road, and besides men and teams could be secured at a more reasonable wage than in the summer months.

# NEW HOUSES BEING BUILT

Fine Residences Are Going Up in Different Parts of Myrtle Point.

Myrtle Point is having quite a little building boom now, according to the Enterprise, which prints the following:

Perhaps the most notable improvement in any part of town is that taking place in the southeast portion where a number of new residences have been built and others are in process of construction. A new house for L. B. Fetter on the stage road, east of the Michael place, is just receiving its finishing touches; a concrete foundation is being laid just beyond for a handsome modern residence for Ben McMullen, just across the road from his large new barn. A. M. Arnold has built a temporary home on the place he bought from Mrs. Bender. On the flat, back of the Fetter home, J. F. Stevens has built a new house. Farther up the stage line is a new bungalow cottage being built by Mr. Darnell, and beyond that is a comfortable new house for Dal, Belleu and family. Mr. Guernsey, who built a couple of small temporary houses last year, has lumber on the ground for other improvements, and on the Gant place is the large new barn built for R. C. Dement and which is one of the most commodious and convenient barns yet built in this section. All this looks good and progressive for southeast Myrtle Point and the country immediately beyond. A large portion of this progress has been made possible by the subdivision of the Ferrey tract through which the stage road runs.
