WILL BOOST FOR RAILROAD

Eugene Citizens to Meet and Discuss Electric Line to Coos Bay.

The Eugene Guard says: At the court house on Tuesday evening the builders of the Eugene to Coos Bay railroad will meet the people of Eugene and Lane county and present the data obtained by their survey just completed by the Lane County Asset Company. The company now feel they have tangible facts concerning construction and traffic that will interest the people of Eugene and a large number of our people will no doubt be on hand to learn as much as possible about this enterprise. With the opening up of our coast harbors and building of the Panama Canal it becomes a growing necessity for Eugene to do all she can to get direct railroad communication with the nearest seaport. The estimates show by the engineer's reports will, it is said, reveal a good business proposition that, if supported by fair cooperation of the people interested, will be easily accomplished. C. C. Chapman, manager of the Portland Commercial Club, the great State booster, will be on hand to tell the advantages of commercial development, and B. F. Mulkey, candidate for Congress and a native Lane county boy, will also be present and tell what he thinks about this enterprise. The meeting is called for the purpose of taking the people of Eugene through the figures supporting the merits of this work, in order that each person interested may have a chance to get the facts at first hand from the proper authorities and not from garbled rumors. In order to secure additional money for grading the roadbed from Eugene to Elmira the people want to know the merits of the enterprise as based on facts obtained by the survey, and the engineers will be on hand to explain all technicalities and make plain the feasibility of the undertaking.
