NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN PERKINS DISAPPEARANCE CASE

The Body of Missing Man Has Not Yet Been Discovered.

GARRISON IS IN COQUILLE JAIL.

Offer of Reward Starts Several Men to Join in the Search.

Nothing new has developed in the Bay Perkins case. This morning someone started a report that the body had been found, but it was without foundation.

The fact that the county has offered a reward of \$100 for the recovery of the body stimulated some to go to the woods and make a search in the belief that possibly Perkins had been killed on the way in from Summer.

Garrison is in the county jail in Coquille, to which place he was taken yesterday in an automobile. According to reports, he has shown signs of not being entirely balanced mentally.

ROOSEVELT REPLIES.

Makes Answer to the Statement By Mayor of Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 8.—On being shown the statements made by the Mayor of Milwaukee, Colonel Roosevelt promptly said: "On this trip I have made no partisan political speeches and of course shall not now be discussing either State party matters or municipal party matters. If any one wishes to know my views on what is usually called Socialism they will find them set out in such a fashion that it is impossible to misinterpret them or misunderstand them, in the magazine articles to which the Mayor refers and I advise them to read the articles themselves and not what the Mayor says of them."

WILL OPERATE THE CANNERY

New Machinery and Supplies Arrive For the Plant at Empire.

The salmon cannery at Empire is to be opened for operation about the middle of the month. It will be conducted by Elijah Smith and Mr. Tallant by a canning company at Astoria. To-day the Breakwater brought in some new machinery and a supply of cans which were unloaded at Empire.

New sanitary machines are being installed to facilitate the work. It will take about two weeks to get the cannery in readiness, but as the fish will not begin until about then, it will be ample time.

The schedule of prices for fish this season has not been definitely established. It is expected that a rate of three cents per pound for Chinooks and twenty cents each for silversides will prevail.

WILL MEET AGAIN FRIDAY

Ballinger - Pinchot Committee Adjourns After Passing Resolution Against Secretary.

At the executive meeting of the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee yesterday Senator Fletcher of Florida, Democrat, introduced a resolution holding that the Secretary of the Interior was an unfaithful public officer and should be removed. Representative Madison, Republican, offered a substitute resolution, holding that the charges made by Pinchot and Glavis, former chief of a field division of the general land office, were maintained.

Democratic members replied that they had been months considering the evidence. Nelson took a vote voting present himself, then made a ruling that no quorum was on hand.

IS THE ASSEMBLY REPUBLICAN?

Judge Watkins Issues an Open Letter Challenge to the Republican Central Committee of Coos County to Discuss Question.

The following vigorous communication is self-explanatory: TO THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF COOS COUNTY, OREGON: Gentlemen—The late Republican assembly for Coos county called by you for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Republican party for said county, among others, passed and published the following resolution:

"We are in favor of open warfare as opposed to hushwhacking; we favor publicity as opposed to button-holing."

The writer is opposed to any assembly called for the purpose of nominating any candidates for any party; he is in favor of the direct primary; he believes the calling of any assembly for any such purpose violates the spirit and intent of the direct primary law, and that in calling that assembly you assumed and exercised authority you did not possess.

TWO KILLED AND MANY HURT IN BURLINGTON RAILROAD WRECK

HUGH M'LAIN IS ON TICKET

Gets Petition to Salem in Time to Run For Railroad Commissioner.

The Portland Oregonian, in a special telegram from Salem, tells the following regarding Hugh McLain being given a place on the ticket:

"It has been ascertained that Hugh McLain, of Marshfield, candidate for State Railroad Commissioner on the Democratic ticket, will be given a place on the primary nominating ballot, further petitions being received from him at the office of Secretary of State.

Saturday night McLain was short on his petitions two precincts from Clackamas county and 109 signatures at large. When the mail was received by the Secretary of State to-day it was found that McLain had mailed a sufficient number of signatures and additional sheets to make up for the discrepancy.

R. A. Cople of Marshfield will also be given a place, his petitions arriving in the mails Saturday. He is a Democratic candidate for Representative from the Sixth District and his home is in Marshfield.

CHEERS FOR PINCHOT.

Is Given a Great Ovation on Appearance at St. Paul.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 8. — The two ideas of conserving natural resources met squarely when Senator Beveridge in an eloquent speech yesterday declared for national control, while James J. Hill argued the contrary. Gifford Pinchot was given a wild ovation when he appeared and tears streamed down his face as the spectators stood in their seats cheering for him. Beveridge attempted to say something complimentary of Pinchot, but the first mention of his name brought forth a storm of cheers which drowned his remarks for the time, and cries of "Pinchot, Pinchot," rang through the auditorium. He was dragged forward and in a voice that shook with emotion as he thanked the audience, said: "It is magnificent to hear the sound policies of conservation acclaimed as has been done here to-day. Conservation has won out. I thank you."
