

SHORT TIME TO REGISTER

Books Close Sept. 14th For the Primaries Which Are Held on Sept. 24th.

The registration of voters for the primaries close Sept. 14th. The primaries are to be held Sept. 24th, but the registration closes on the date mentioned. After the primaries, or on Sept. 25, the registration opens again for the general election.

Some of the voters complain that there is no place for them to register after 6 P. M. and state that they are engaged in work up to that time and cannot be in the business districts of the city. Billy Smith, the barber, states that he had three men who wanted to register after 6 P. M., but that he could not find anyone after that hour to register the men.

Provisions, however, have been made for this. E. O. Hall, at 276 Front street, has agreed to keep his office open after 6 P. M. for the benefit of those who cannot get to the city to register in the daytime.

Men employed at the Smith mill can register after 6 P. M. any evening with W. E. Squires in his grocery store near the mill.

ship. It will not make you a christian by going to church any more than going into a stable will make you a horse. One has to comply with the requirements before he can enter the life as Christ described it to Nicodemus.

"Regeneration," said Mr. Lyon in summing up his discourse, on the positive side, "is the personal relation of a personal soul to a personal Christ. It is absolutely essential for salvation and it is also essential for service. You cannot be born again unless you cut loose from sin, neither can you be born again unless you accept Jesus Christ."

At noon yesterday about fifty workers, together with the evangelist and his singer, went on the steamer Alert to the Smith mill, where about one hundred mill men gathered about the singer and the speaker for a short service. It was probably the first time that the gospel has ever been preached in this way on Coos Bay. It was a unique feature, too, to see a steamer loaded with singing passengers, who are desirous of helping their fellow men into the kingdom of God.
