SPENDERS AND SPEEDERS AND THE AUTOMOBILE.

THERE is a growing disposition here. Business men say that it to find fault with the automobile has brought extravagance and that the investments in motor cars are responsible in large measure for the close times of the present. People who walk or drive horses declare that the advent of the automobile has made the highways positively unsafe. And so the criticism goes on.

The truth is, however, that there is no menace in the mere use of the automobile, but only in its abuse. Spenders and speeders are responsible for whatever disrepute attaches to it. The automobile itself stands for progress; it is a modern convenience; it has fully justified itself and it will continue with us in some form or other.

But its abuses deserve criticism. For instance: When a young man of not much more than \$100 a month income takes the little money he had saved to make first payment on a home and uses it for the first payment on an automobile, the automobile is a detriment to him and to the community in which he lives. He has become a spender, and spenders are harmful. When a business man puts a mortgage on his store to get a touring car and begins devoting more time to joy riding than to business, his automobile is a detriment to both him and his community, for he becomes a spender.

These instances are not fictitious. They are real, and they can be multiplied many times, here in Oregon and everywhere. When irresponsible speeders chase up and down streets and highways without regard to life and limb of pedestrians and occupants of horse carriages, the automobile is abused, not used. And this is done, here and everywhere, many times every day and night. The number of serious accidents due to reckless motor car driving has increased rapidly in the past year and every issue of a newspaper has its stories of death and disaster chargeable to speeders. The automobile itself is all right, but spenders and speeders are all wrong and they bring disrepute to everything they touch.

France spends about \$100,000,000 annually for tobacco, which is chiefly consumed in smoking. Great care is taken in that country to prevent the destruction of all kinds of property by fire, but no one thinks of doing anything to prevent the great waste which results from the burning of tobacco, probably because those responsible for it get more fun out of their expenditure than they would from saving their money and applying it to other uses.

The four express companies get net returns of from 43 to 100 per cent on their business. The Government, carrying the mails, scores an annual deficit of millions. Either the mails are carried too cheaply or the express matter too dearly, though it is clear that the express business might be handled by the Government at a price much lower than it is and leave enough surplus to make up the deficit now created in the Postoffice Department.

A British paper, commenting on the fact that the metric system has been made obligatory in Denmark, Germany, Argentina, Austria-Hungary, Belgium, Bulgaria, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Greece, Italy, Mexico, the Netherlands, Norway, Peru, Portugal, Roumania, Servia, Spain, Switzerland, and France, says that it is "permissive" in the United States and Great Britain. The word permissive implies the possibility of its voluntary adoption by the two countries mentioned, but any one who fancies that Americans or Britons will make a change of any kind which merely promises improvement without being forced to do so is seriously mistaken. We plume ourselves on our progressive tendencies, but it is hard to induce us to "get a move on" when the doing so involves the abandonment of old usages.

EXPECT BIG CROWDS.

Extensive Plans Being Made For Oregon State Fair.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 9.—The Oregon State Fair, Salem, September 12th to 17th, promises to have the most successful session in its history. Features never before incorporated will be seen this year by State Fair visitors and these are generally of a high order. There have been many improvements made to the grounds and buildings, a new water system installed, with new barns for stock and added accommodations for racing horses. The string of horses listed for this year will probably be ahead of the racers heretofore appearing on the fair grounds. The attendance, too, promises to surpass crowds of previous years.

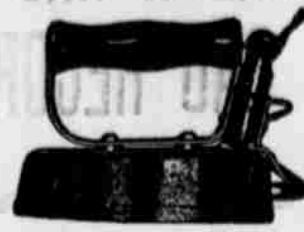
