Raised the Peggy.—The launch Peggy, which caught fire and was sunk a week or so ago, has been raised and repaired and is now ready for use again.

Charter Cost Less.—The cost of the proposed new charter of the city of Marshfield was \$550 instead of \$625, as has been stated. The three attorneys who drafted it received only \$425 instead of \$500 and the cost of the stenographic work done by Miss Violet Henderson in preparing it was \$125.

P. A. Devers Busy.—The Times is in receipt of a copy of The Pasco Express, which gives an extended write-up to the Pasco Reclamation project, of which P. A. Devers, formerly of this city, is general manager. Over \$300,000 has been expended to date, in covering 7,000 acres, and as much more will be used to irrigate 5,000 more. All of the lands around Pasco below the 1,000-foot level are now under water, every drop of which is pumped from the Snake River.

Leaves For His Health.—Ben Schuyler has resigned his place as nightwatchman in the business district of the city and will leave Saturday for Portland on the Breakwater. His health has not been the best and he is going away for the winter on his doctor's advice to avoid the rainy season here. He thinks that a change of climate will benefit him. Mr. Schuyler is not fully decided on his plans yet, but he will probably stay away all winter. His family will follow him later. Nicholas Reifert will temporarily fill Schuyler's place as nightwatchman.
