

MINISTER IS A BANKRUPT

J. C. Lininger Files Petition For Relief of Note Endorsement Liabilities.

J. C. Lininger, Presbyterian minister late of North Bend, has filed in the United States court a petition in bankruptcy, which has been referred to Judge C. A. Sehlbrede as referee. The liabilities are given as \$35,408 and are practically all notes due to parties in Chicago and other eastern cities. It is stated by the petitioner that nearly all of the liabilities were brought about as an endorser or surety for other parties. The only assets are household goods valued at \$141, which are claimed as exempt.

S. B. Lininger, wife of J. C. Lininger, also filed a petition in bankruptcy. The liabilities are \$16,500, and the assets household goods and clothing valued at \$50 and claimed as exempt. The cases are practically the same as S. B. Lininger was endorser on some of the same notes as J. C. Lininger. As the only assets in either case are claimed as exempt there will be nothing for the creditors. The referee has not yet set a time for the hearing of the creditors. Mr. Lininger recently accepted a call to Pendleton, Ore. He was formerly pastor at North Bend.

Will Sell Goods.

Referee Sehlbrede, in the matter of the bankruptcy of William J. Preston, who conducted an electrical supply house in Marshfield, has given an order empowering Arthur K. Peck as trustee to sell the assets which consist of goods on hand. The liabilities in the case are about \$1,100 and the assets will probably not bring more than enough to pay the expenses of the case, so there will likely be nothing for the creditors.

The Frey Case.

Another step has been taken in the case of L. A. Frey. Mr. Frey made an assignment and after this was done Attorney John D. Goss, representing a number of the creditors, filed a petition for an involuntary bankruptcy. Judge Sehlbrede received a telegram this morning from the clerk of the United States court stating that Peter Loggie had been appointed temporary trustee and gave bond in the sum of \$10,000. Mr. Loggie will remain as trustee and take care of the property until after the adjudication, when the creditors will select a trustee.

PIONEER CITIZEN DEAD.

A. Willard Dies at His Home Near Prosper.

COQUILLE, Ore., Sept. 9. — Al. Willard, who died at his home near Prosper, was a well known pioneer citizen. The funeral was held Wednesday morning from the Methodist Church in Coquille and the burial was at the Masonic Cemetery.

Mr. Willard was born in Shannahan, Illinois, on October 23, 1870, and was 39 years, 11 months and 22 days old at death.

Mr. Willard lived many years at the old home in the Roy settlement. He leaves a wife, formerly Miss McCue, and two sons, eleven and twelve years old, beside his mother, Mrs. O. R. Willard, two brothers, Capt. O. R. and Frank Willard, and a sister, Mrs. A. G. Miller.

HALL-LEWIS MAKES REPLY

Answers Assertions Made Regarding His Work As County Fruit Inspector.

EDITOR TIMES: Replying to the arraignment of the fruit inspection service, printed in your issue of the 5th inst., I have this to say:

That the inspector is acting entirely within his instructions in making his headquarters in Marshfield, the majority of the fruit marketed passing through this port.

That the fruit growers of the Coquille Valley were duly notified of the enforcement of the horticultural laws, at the opening of the season, through the Coquille Valley Fruit Growers' Association.

That the assertion that three-fourths of the fruit sold in Marshfield from the local ranches would not pass inspection is false.

That the assertion that Marshfield is being made the "goat" in the matter of fruit inspection is also false.

That the purpose of the State Board of Horticulture is to upbuild the fruit raising industry by keeping as far as possible, infested fruit out of the State by causing owners of orchards to eradicate the pests therefrom; by making the growing of DISEASED fruit unprofitable, and such fruit liable to seizure.

That the inference is plain that "Mr. Kicker" would like the county inspector to remove his headquarters from Marshfield, for reasons best known to "Mr. Kicker," but also surmised by the inspector.

That the identity of "Mr. Kicker" is clear to the county inspector.

That the inspector is subject to the orders of the State Board and not to those of "Mr. Kicker."

That the hardships created, if any exist, are entirely the result of the neglect on the part of the growers of their own property; and, finally,

That "Mr. Kicker" would show better taste if he used his influence and argument in support of a movement of great importance to the horticultural interests of this county instead of assuming the attitude of a knocker and charlatan, casting about for means to evade laws, the enforcement of which interferes and in a measure curtails the profits which he has been wont to glean out of traffic in diseased, infested and otherwise contraband fruits.

IS PROUD OF BOAT RECORD

Captain of Breakwater Says Boat Has Been Doing Great Ocean Traveling.

The steamer Breakwater has made a fine record while on the five day schedule between Portland and Coos Bay. The following under a big headline appeared in the Oregonian: "When the steamer Breakwater swung into her dock yesterday afternoon, arriving from Coos Bay, she completed a record which Capt. Macgenn proudly declares has not, in his knowledge, been equaled by any vessel afloat."

The staunch little steamer has for nearly five months maintained a five-day schedule from this port to Coos Bay, making 600 nautical miles each round trip, and in that time, her captain declares, has not been off her schedule an hour at any time.

Regardless of fog, wind or bar conditions, the vessel has swung back and forth with the regularity of a pendulum, crossing in and out when the bar was forbidding to other craft, carrying large loads of freight and thousands of passengers.

In all 26 trips were made on the five-day schedule, aggregating 15,600 miles of travel. The schedule was abandoned because the traffic conditions did not warrant so frequent a service. Hereafter the Breakwater will make a trip every week, beginning Tuesday and having two layover days each trip at this end.

During this time Captain Macgenn, the literary skipper of the Breakwater has found plenty of time to work on his great tragic poem, which is promised to the public before long.

"The Breakwater met heavy north-west winds during her passage up the coast and the sea was rough. She carried 106 passengers and a general cargo."
