PLAN TO SELL STOCK

Mass Meeting at Eugene to Discuss Electric Line to Coos Bay.

The plan of the Lane County Asset Company to build a portion of an electric line to Coos Bay was presented at the public of Eugene at a mass meeting held Tuesday evening. B. F. Mulkey, C. C. Chapman of the Portland Commercial Club and other prominent men were there. After hearing of the plan, those present voted to support it and committees have been sent out to receive the stock subscriptions which are needed to put through the project.

A. F. Campbell of the Asset Company set forth the plans. Among other things he stated that it is the desire of the company to construct that portion of the line lying between Eugene and Elmira this year and that it will take the sum of \$109,136 to build it, as near as could be figured out by the engineers. A large number of the ties required for the work, as well as a great deal of the lumber for the bridges and considerable labor, had been subscribed, all cutting the cost of construction down a great deal, so it would take practically \$100,000 to build this portion of the line. Subscriptions to stock in the company are made on very easy payments, ten per cent down and ten per cent each month.

The company has acquired franchises in Eugene, has secured 90 per cent of the right-of-way between Eugene and Elmira, has bought 34 acres of land a few miles west of Eugene, which will be sold by the company at some future date, and has promises of valuable water-front rights on the Sluslaw, at Gardiner and Coos Bay. With all these assets, when the short stretch between Eugene and Elmira is built, the company is sure it can bond the road for a sum sufficient to complete it clear to Coos Bay and to properly equip it with rolling stock. Men who have built an electric line from St. Paul to Duluth, Minn., in exactly this manner are behind the local road. Or it may be, Mr. Campbell said, Hill or some other big magnate may be attracted by the assets the company has gathered and take over the property, thus insuring construction to the coast.

DREDGING ON COOS RIVER

Oregon Will Arrive Latter Part of Month to Work on Bay.

The river dredger is working on Coos river on the government project. The dredge is going over the river from the mouth to Major Tower's cottage on the south fork and snags and logs are being removed and placed on the banks. They will later be sawed up and burned. Roy Rozell is in charge of the dredge. There is a reef in the river which is also to be opened. The dredge will continue at work clearing the river as long as the condition of the water will allow.

The government dredge Oregon is expected here the latter part of the month and will start in work at Pony Slough making the bay channel the full width according to the government project.

A dipper dredge and snag puller is to be built on the Coquille River for use there. The work of building it will begin as soon as the bids are let. It will be similar to the one used on Coos River, and will be operated to clear the Coquille River, amounts having been appropriated for removing the snags and for removing the rocks.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received by the Finance Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, at the office of the City Recorder of said City of Marshfield, in the City Hall of said City, until 4 o'clock P. M. of TUESDAY, the 27th day of September, 1910, for the purchase of street improvement bonds to the amount of \$15,055.27, of the said City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

All of said improvement bonds to be in denominations not exceeding \$500 and bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum from date thereof, payable semi-annually; said bonds to be dated the day of issuance and to mature in ten years thereafter, with prepayment option thereon at face value and accrued interest to date of any semi-annual coupon interest period at, or after, one year from the date of said bonds, upon giving notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in Coos county, Oregon, such notice to be published not less than twice during the month preceding such semi-annual period at which such prepayment thereof will be made. The right is expressly reserved to reject any and all bids and upon all or any of such bids, or proposals, being rejected, if there should remain any bonds unsold, the said bonds may be thereafter sold at private sale by said Common Council of said City of Marshfield, Oregon; but in no event to be sold at less than par and accrued interest. Said bonds are authorized by the laws of the State of Oregon and ordinances of the Common Council of the said City of Marshfield, Oregon.

Assessed valuation of said City of Marshfield, Oregon, is \$1,791,549. Bonded indebtedness is \$54,000. Population—Estimated at 5,000. A certified check for 5 per centum of amount of bid, or proposal must accompany each bid to be forfeited to said City of Marshfield in case bid is accepted and bidder fails to accept and make payment for said bond or bonds, covered thereby, within ten days from date of acceptance of said bid or bids.
