Undergoes Operation.—John Herron this morning underwent a minor operation at the hospital. Dr. J. W. Ingram, who is attending him, reports that Mr. Herron is getting along nicely.

To Grays Harbor.—The steamer Newport is making a trip to Grays Harbor this week with a cargo of lumber. On completing that trip she will be back again on her regular Coos Bay run.

Unloading Lumber.—The schooner Oregon is still unloading lumber at the North Bend box factory. She brought a cargo of spruce lumber from the Randolph Lumber Company on the Coquille River.

Left This Morning.—L. N. Rodby, who resigned his position as night clerk at the Chandler Hotel, left this morning for Vancouver, B. C., where he will take a position as day clerk at the Dunsmuir Hotel.

Goes to Coquille River.—The tug Klybiam of Bandon came to Coos Bay to-day and towed the schooner Esther Buhne to the Coquille River, where she will load lumber to be brought to the box factory at North Bend.

Good Run of Fish.—There is quite a variety of fish in the local market now. Smelt were brought in yesterday and some especially fine halibut have been caught. The big Chinook salmon also seem to be plentiful.

Married in California.—Miss Nettie Beattie, formerly of Coos Bay, was married to J. W. Ross at San Fran-

cisco on August 27th. The bride is a sister of R. A. Church of South Coos River and is quite well known here.

Delayed By Illness.—Miss Josephine Eddy, who was to leave on the Plant Tuesday for California, where she will teach school this winter, was taken suddenly ill Sunday evening which will delay her trip until next week.

Rented Her House.—Mrs. Early has rented her house on Commercial avenue to John Lafon of the C. A. Smith forestry department, who will take possession soon. Mrs. Early will move into a cottage on Central avenue.

Council To-Night.—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening. All of the contractors and others have been summoned to appear and the alleged charges against the engineering department will be thoroughly investigated.

Son Is Better.—W. P. Evans has returned from a business trip to Portland, Pendleton and other Eastern Oregon towns. His son, Eldon Evans, who with Mrs. Evans has been visiting at Baker City, has fully recovered from a threatened attack of typhoid fever.

Milk Higher.—Ranchers are reported to be raising the price of milk, causing some of the local retailers to skirmish to secure a supply elsewhere as they do not feel like boosting the price here. One of the large consumers of milk said to-day he was paying 23 cents a gallon.

Improving His Farm.—J. H. Bridges went up Catching Inlet this morning to his ranch, which he recently purchased. He has 37 acres of bottom land surrounded by hill land. He is putting up a barn and will build a house and expects to make of the place an ideal country home.
