**BETTER FRUIT.**

**EDITOR COOS BAY TIMES:** I came to Coos Bay eight years ago and found a good prospect for fruit and berries and bought 160 acres of land. At that time I was told there was no fruit pest or disease here, but since I have found it all over the county, as I have canvassed a good part of it for the Washington Nursery Company, and I find that sixty per cent of those that have orchards want the law enforced and the rest don't. Now, for example, I have four hundred fruit trees from one to seven years old and I want to raise first-class fruit. On two sides of my land and adjoining my land there are orchards infested with scale and oyster shell bark louse. Now, I have sprayed every year and I can't keep my trees clean. If in town some contagious disease starts up the Board of Health never stops till they quash it out. I say to the "Kicker," How about me, have I no right to protection. Yours truly,
