TO HAVE \$3,000 SCHOOL.
Gold Beach Will Have a Fine New Structure.

TRACKS WILL BE CHANGED

Important Improvement is to Be Made By Railroad at Coquille.

COQUILLE, Ore., Sept. 16.—The city council of Coquille has completed the arrangements for the changing of the railroad tracks from Front street to the water front. The improvement is an important one for Coquille.

That the city should grant a right of way along the water front across the city property lying just east of the present site of the railroad depot and also across Ferry and C streets and in turn the railroad releases the present trackage on Front street and agrees to construct a suitable roadway to be maintained as a public highway from the present depot site on Ferry street to the new depot to be built or the removal of the present building to a point between two or three hundred feet west of the present site and adjacent to the location of the switch below the depot. It is further agreed by the railroad to begin construction within ninety days after the deeds for the right of way have been placed in escrow and the construction to be completed within six months.

The additional right of way is to be purchased by the property owners along Front street and those directly benefited by the removal of the tracks and agreements have been made with all but one of the owners of the necessary right of way and it is hoped that this can be secured without difficulty as it is one of the lots directly benefited by the change.

WILL HAVE NEW MILL.

Wisconsin Man Plans to Build in Curry County.

GOLD BEACH, Ore., Sept. 17.—A new sawmill and sash and door factory for Curry county seems to be an assured fact. Charles H. Burbot of Appleton, Wis., who has been looking over the county, has secured timber lands and has announced that he will erect a sawmill. He has gone to San Francisco to buy the machinery. The mill will be located on what is known as the Nannie Grant camp just above Indian Creek. In addition to the sawmill there will be sash and door machinery so the plant can turn out anything needed in the building line.
