#### DIMICK VS. BOWERMAN.

IN THE FIGHT for the Republican nomination for Governor the issue is clean cut. It is a straight out contest between men who uphold the principle of the direct primary and the machine politicians who are trying to annul our primary law.

It is true the assemblyites declare they are friendly to the direct primary. But this is a false claim made for campaign purposes only. Assemblyism is the very antithesis of the direct primary. To uphold the Assembly scheme means to go back to the convention system—to the making of nomination in meetings that are packed and manipulated in behalf of certain men and certain interests. It means the re-establishment of political bossism in Oregon. It will mean the revival of the very abuses of which the people had become so tired and to remedy which they passed the direct primary law. If assemblyism is upheld it will mean that Oregon is to go back into the foul hole of political corruption from which it emerged several years ago and from which other States of the union are now climbing just as fast as they can.

In the fight for the gubernatorial nomination there are two distinct candidates in the field. Judge Grant B. Dimick is the champion of the direct primary law while Jay Bowerman is the candidate of the politicians who are trying to cut the heart out of that law and leave it a worthless hulk. Aside from Judge Dimick there are two other anti-assembly candidates in the field, Hofer and Abraham. But neither has any degree of strength nor any show of being nominated. Their chief backing comes from assembly men and assembly papers who are touting them because they want to throw as many anti-assembly votes as possible to those men. Votes that go to Hofer or Abraham cannot go to Judge Dimick.

As the situation exists now and will exist when the primary election is held September 24th, the fight for the Republican nomination for Governor is between Dimick and Bowerman. Between those two men the Republicans of Oregon must choose. Judge Dimick is of the progressive school. He upholds the direct primary law and Statement No. One. He opposes the assembly. Bowerman is the reactionary or staidpat candidate. He is an assemblyite and has the endorsement of an assembly-convention that was packed and manipulated for his benefit and for the benefit of the interests back of his candidacy.

Which man do you favor, Mr. Republican Voter?

#### LAW SHOULD BE LAW.

IS THE LAW a joke? A statute was enacted by the people of Oregon in the last general election. It is found in chapter 2, page 15, session laws of 1909, and is as follows: "Section 1. That we the people of the State of Oregon hereby instruct our representatives and senators in our legislative assembly as such of-

fers to vote for and elect the candidate for United States Senator from this State who receives the highest number of votes at our general election."

This law was passed by vote of the people of the State. It was voted for by 69,668 electors. Only 21,162 voted against it. It was carried in every county in the State. It is the law. It is law passed, not by a few proxies in a Legislature, but at a regular election with all the people participating.

No statute could better reflect the public purpose, says the Portland Journal. No statute could more perfectly mirror the people's demand. But here in Portland and elsewhere are puny men who ask to be elected to the Legislature while insisting that they are against Oregon's direct election. Fat McArthur has so declared himself. So have all the candidates on the Assembly legislative ticket. They boast that they are against Statement No. One, and yet Statement No. One is a mere agreement by the candidate to obey the law as phrased in the above people's statute, a statute created and solemnized by the votes of 69,668 Oregon citizens. Are they bigger than the law? Are men who hold themselves to be above the law and above the votes of 69,668 of their fellow citizens the proper men to send to the Legislature? Are men who claim to be above the law good men to send to Salem to make laws? Are men who thus give a public example of defiance of a living statute the kind of men to elevate to public office?

Law should be law. The people's will should be above any man's will. Men who do not agree to that proposition should never be elected to office. Men who insist that the Senator should be selected by the Legislature should remain in private life. If they will not agree beforehand to let the people make the choice, they should be repudiated at the polls.

## HUME DENIES ALLEGATION

CANDIDATE FOR JOINT REPRESENTATIVE ANSWERS LAST STATEMENT OF S. P. PEIRCE—STATES HIS PLATFORM.

MARSHFIELD, Sept. 21, 1910. TO THE VOTERS OF COOS AND CURRY COUNTIES:
