LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF INTEREST.

"The Dora and Brewster Valleys are forging ahead fast," remarked Robert Swanton, of the Brown Drug Company, who returned from an outing at the M. C. Miller ranch in Dora Valley. "I had the finest outing I have ever enjoyed. The E. Abernethy mill is cutting lumber for three fine residences at Dora, one for M. C. Miller, one for Ed. Abernethy and one for F. Baker. Baker and Miller are planning to convert their places into fine summer resorts. Two fine houses are underway at Brewster. Neva Harry is making good progress on the Brewster Mountain road and Lee Mast and M. C. Miller have concluded their work on the Cherry Hill contract. They had to stop because the county ran out of funds as a result of the Southern Oregon Company, Southern Pacific Company and the Smith-Powers Company refusing to pay the special road tax, the companies now contesting it in the courts. It is too bad these companies can hold up such needed improvements. The forest fires burned over an area about ten miles long and a mile wide near Dora, but did not hurt the good timber, being confined to the brushy tracts. This will make a fine hunting ground next year."

"There has been a wonderful transformation in Marshfield since my visit here about three years ago," remarked Dennis Flynn, the prominent Oklahoma Republican leader and capitalist, who is the guest of his old friend, Wm. Grimes. "Oklahoma City has made wonderful advances but proportionately to its size, not any more than Marshfield. My old friend, Grimes, has enthused me over this section. He is a wonderfully fine fellow and when he was in Oklahoma last summer we did our best to keep him there but he was so imbued with Coos Bay that we could not keep him away from here, and since my arrival this time I can better understand what attracts him." Mr. Flynn served eight terms in Congress from Oklahoma and the territory, and for years has been the recognized leader in the Republican party in that country. He was surprised to find so many former Oklahomans here and counted up seventy-five or so who are now on the Bay. He will spend another week or so here.
