

# REGISTRATION FIGURES FOR COOS COUNTY ARE COMPILED

The registration in Coos county this year is a heavy one. According to the figures furnished by the County Clerk and indicated in the tabulated abstract there is a total of 3,316 voters registered before the primaries. Last year before the election there were 3,939 registered. When the books go back into the hands of those who are registering this difference will be more than made up and the total registration before the election this year will be greater than last year.

Populists are rather scarce. There are only three registered in the county. There are only 31 prohibitionists. The following table shows the number of voters registering in the different precincts:

owners to pay and seventy cents for each post for the city to pay. This seventy cents is the charge that will be made for keeping one light on each post lighted from midnight until morning.

### Delay City Charter.

City Attorney Goss reported that he had not had ample time to go over the proposed new city charter fully and that he thought it was a matter that the council should also go into thoroughly before submitting it to a vote of the people. He said that he felt certain there were a number of changes that might be made to advantage. He said that while the matter could be rushed through and be submitted at the city election in December, he thought it would be better to wait and submit it at a special election. He called attention to the fact that the city officials are acquainted with the provisions of the present charter enabling them to go ahead fairly well with the work, but that it would take them some time to familiarize themselves with the new one. The council decided not to try to submit it at the city election but to wait until they have time to study it more thoroughly.

### Other Business.

Mayor Straw reported that W. C. Duebner was getting anxious for the city to do something about his lot where it projects into the street. Councilman Powers said that the council had once decided that it would give Mr. Duebner \$350 to straighten out the street but would not give a cent more and if he didn't want to take that, he could remain as he is. The other councilmen concurred except Councilman Nelson who opposed giving Mr. Duebner anything. City Attorney Goss reported that he was unable to reach any agreement with Robert Marsden and J. W. Bennett regarding the water right which they claim to hold on the city park. Plans for condemning the water were discussed. It may be that Fourth street will be opened north of Highland and this will turn the spring water away from the park. The matter will be decided later.

City Attorney Goss was authorized to endeavor to expedite the settlement of the injunction proceedings in the North Cedar street assessment case by arranging a settlement with the Lapp and other conflicting interests. If he is unsuccessful, the matter will be fought out in court next month. Mayor Straw advised against accepting I. Haeker's offer to donate parts of certain streets in North Marshfield, west of Front street, providing the city pays for the fill. The matter has been hanging fire for some time, but owing to the conflicting claims of ownership concerning the property which will result in a long legal fight, Mayor Straw said he was opposed to doing anything about it. No action was taken.

Hagquist and Bjorquist were ordered paid \$324 on their street contract, and Hugh McLain about \$800 on his street and sewer contracts. The Highland avenue street improvement by Contractor Bliven was accepted. On James Baines' verbal request, the council decided to arrange additional ditches for draining the south part of Railroad Addition and to put in tide gates.

The city attorney was instructed to draft an amendment to the building ordinance so that people who have to move their buildings on account of the street grade being changed will not have to pay for a permit. The matter was brought up by Peter Johnson, who protested against paying \$2.50 or \$2.75 for raising his house at the corner of Third and Market. He will escape this expense by waiting until the ordinance is amended.

C. Magary's pay as inspector of the West Marshfield sewer was allowed.

### MANY HURT IN WRECK.

Railroad Collision Near Lisbon Injures Many. (By Associated Press.) LISBON, Portugal, Sept. 21.—One hundred and fifty persons were injured in a railroad train wreck near Oporto. None were killed. The greater number of the victims of the accident were but slightly injured.

"The greatest faculty in the world," said Mr. Lyon, "is the power of a choice. In this we see the difference between the man and the animal. God gave to man this power of choice. All activities wait for this choice. We make choice continually. A man cannot buy a spool of thread for his wife or a thousand-acre farm without exercising this power."

During the course of his sermon, Mr. Lyon dealt with various choices in a most practical manner. ## BOOSTER FOR COOS BAY

### B. F. Mulkey Says Government Should Make Improvements Here.

That the government should make a deep harbor of Coos Bay was urged by Hon. B. F. Mulkey, candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress, when he spoke recently at Eugene at a meeting held to promote the proposed electric line of the Lane County Asset Company from Eugene to Coos Bay. Regarding Mr. Mulkey's speech, a Eugene paper says: "He made an eloquent and forceful plea for the emancipation of Western Oregon from the slavery of exorbitant freight rates, and saw in the present movement of the Lane County Asset Company a means of freeing the people of Eugene and this section of the Willamette Valley. He said it is the duty of Congress to keep its eyes on Coos Bay and deepen the harbor so that battleships could anchor there. He spoke of the time when the railroad was built to Yaquina Bay, how the price of the Willamette Valley farmer's wheat and other produce went up and the cost of table necessities was lowered, but this road was gobbled up by the corporation that has its hands on the throats of the people of Western Oregon and the same old conditions again prevailed. Mr. Mulkey made the statement that as soon as a railroad from Eugene to tide water is built, this city will be enjoying the same advantages that Los Angeles is now."

### TAFT IN HOME CITY.

No Special Entertainment Arranged at Cincinnati. (By Associated Press.) CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 21.—No extensive programme of entertainment has been arranged for President Taft during his visit to this, his home city. His coming is said to be merely for the purpose of attending the Ohio Valley Exposition and looking into his personal affairs. There are reports in circulation, however, that he will be a party to several important political conferences. He arrived yesterday afternoon and will leave for Washington Friday or Saturday.

### ENGLAND WILL HOLD.

To Co-Operate With This Country Regarding Opium Trade. (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Ambassador Reed has cabled the State Department from London that the British government will co-operate with the United States in the forthcoming conference to devise means for the regulation of the opium trade. It is understood at the State Department that the Chinese government may not be ready for at least a year.
