The gold was first found about fifteen miles up from Harbor on the Chetco River.

President Taft Gives His Views on Several Important National Questions.

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 22.—After speaking of the development during the ten years in which he has been absent and saying he expected to take up his residence here after his duties in Washington were concluded, President Taft devoted his remarks to improvement of the Ohio River from Pittsburgh to Cairo and the outlook for the future.

Denouncing the Congressional "pork barrel," President Taft urged the reconstruction of the method of dealing with water ways improvements in the United States.

"THERE SHALL BE LEFT AT THE END OF THE LIST OF CANDIDATES FOR NOMINATION TO EACH DIFFERENT OFFICE, A BLANK SPACE IN WHICH THE ELECTOR MAY WRITE THE NAME OF ANY PERSON NOT PRINTED ON THE BALLOT, FOR WHOM HE DESIRES TO VOTE AS A NOMINEE FOR SUCH OFFICE."

This is very explicit. It does not say that the candidate you vote for must be of the same politics as the voter, but you may write the name of ANY person. The printed tickets are all provided with this extra line as specified in the law so that the name may be written thereon.

This interpretation means that there will be considerable of this scratch voting at the primaries.
