**A FINAL WORD.**

**T**O-MORROW the Republicans of Coos county will indicate by their votes the principles for which they stand. The issue is clear and clean cut. The only question is whether the Republicans are ready to repudiate the direct primary and return to the old convention system, with Portland bosses running and ruling the State or whether they shall assert their independence of the bosses and choose their own candidates in their own way.

From all over the country comes the news of the success of the progressive idea in the Republican ranks. Everywhere the reactionaries are being repudiated. From all parts of Oregon comes the same story of popular uprising against the Assembly. Coos county should and The Times believes will join this procession of progress and line up with the New Nationalism that Republicans everywhere are espousing.

One of the clearly significant things inherent in the present political rebellion is the doom of the boss big and little. As he has always been the logical figure of the old system and its most intolerable as well, he is, naturally, the special object of attack by the new movement, and his doom is as certain as the flight of time and not far distant on the course of the flight.

There was never a rotter humbug than this political boss; he has never had a scintilla of right to existence; he has never been anything but a low grafter whose stealings were wrought under the cover of a dubious relation to the people and the hidden chain of pickers and pickings that formed his bulwark between the treasures of the people and his private lair. Men have tried to invest him with a romantic and semi-alluring guise; but they failed because such garniture will not stick to the thief and his thievery. He is, according to his history, of low origin, since it takes a man of such calibre to reconcile himself to the dirty program indispensable to the post and business everywhere from Portland, Oregon, to Portland, Maine.

He is generally in the gum-shoe brigade; he takes care to hide from

the spotlight while he keeps his henchmen in the glare to the end that he shall keep the people thoroughly fooled as to their faith and virtue while the public eye is blinded to the finesse and trickery he and they are dealing.

Mr. Roosevelt recently described the difference between a leader and a boss by saying, "the former leads and guides the people, while the boss drives them." This is clear and rational and acceptable. That's why the Portland bosses are trying to do with Oregon Republicans. Driving them to support a ticket that to have selected.
