(By Associated Press.)
SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 24. — A murder thought to be a "Black Hand" mystery, was committed near Fourteenth and Wall streets, yesterday. Following the sound of three shots, the body of an unknown, well dressed Austrian was found in a clump of trees. The slayer had disappeared. The murdered man evidently was not a laboring man. There is nothing on the person to identify it, but \$4 in the pockets seems to preclude the theory of robbery.

Hunters' Fined—Dell Sanders was fined in Justice Penock's court for shooting ducks out of season. He was arrested by Deputy Game Warden Cal. Wright for shooting ducks on Sept. 14th.

Slugs on Request—At the request of many, Mr. Harris will repeat "The Holy City" at the Sunday morning service.

Goes to Astoria—Jess Day left to-day for Astoria, where he will go into training for another fight with Soldier Berg. He was accompanied by Sing Hosan, the Chinese fighter from Beaver Hill who will fight preliminary at Astoria.

Newport Detained—The steamer Newport was to have arrived from Portland to-day but on account of having to wait for some repairs in Portland she will not arrive here until to-morrow. The Newport will start on her next trip from Portland on Oct. 1st.

Appoint Watchman—The members of the Merchants' Patrol, composed of business men who have interests on the water front, held a meeting last night and appointed J. McCutcheon as night watchman. He will go on duty the first of the month. He takes the place of Ben Schuyler, who resigned and went away for his health.

Starts on Long Trip—The barkentine Echo, of the Simpson Lumber Company fleet, has completed taking on her cargo of lumber and will leave for Valparaiso, Chili. She will carry a cargo of about 900,000 feet of lumber. After delivering this cargo she may go to Australia before returning home or may come directly back here. It should take the vessel about eighty days to make the trip from Coos Bay to Chili.

Must Watch Limit—Deputy Game Warden Wright says hunters must be careful to watch the hour limit for shooting ducks. They are liable to a fine if they shoot later than one hour after sundown. They can begin shooting one hour before sunrise. The season for shooting all shore and wading birds opens Oct. 1st. The pigeon shooting season is the same as that for ducks.
