BANDON, Ore., Sept. 24.—One of the largest logs ever sawed in Coos county was run through the mill of the George W. Moore Lumber Company at Bandon. It was nine feet in diameter and made 10,917 feet of lumber. This is one of the record logs cut for this locality.

## COUNCIL TAKES ACTION.

Coquille Ready to Close Deal For Changing Railroad Tracks.

Final steps have been taken for the changing of the tracks of the railroad in Coquille City. Regarding the action of the council the Coquille Valley Sentinel says:

At a special meeting of the Common Council of the City of Coquille this week an ordinance was passed empowering the city attorney to close the deal and complete the purchase of the Collier water front property below the present city wharf and also the V-shaped lot lying just west of the steam laundry property. The purchase price of the tract is to be \$6,000.

This is the closing chapter in the two years' endeavor on the part of the business men of Front street toward the moving of the tracks of the local railway company from Front street to the water front. The only remaining part of this work is to complete the survey of the property which will compose the right of way of the railway company and to secure deeds to this necessary property and this work will proceed as soon as the survey has been completed.

CURRY COUNTY MAN SHOT.

Walter Tinker Killed Recently at Grants Pass.

A Curry county man was recently killed at Grants Pass. The Gold Beach Globe regarding the case says:

Word reached this place last week that Walter Tinker was shot through the lungs at Grants Pass about a month ago, from which he succumbed after a lingering illness of several days. ## Enrollment Larger Than Any Previous Year.

Bandon's public schools opened Monday morning with a total enrollment of 366 pupils in all grades. This is an increase of 40 over the first day last year; the enrollment at that time was 326. This would indicate that Bandon has sustained a substantial growth in population during the last year. The high school opens with an enrollment of 56 this year as against 45 last, a gain of 24.5 per cent.

The teaching staff this year is: H. C. Ostien, superintendent; Mrs. Ostien and Miss Rose Hutchins, teachers in the high school. The grade teachers are: Pensie Kopf, first; Mary Marsh, second; Dorothy Gibson, third; Inez Lusk, fourth; Kate Rosa, fifth; Louise Latimer, sixth; Vivian Hutchins, seventh; Pearl Walker, eighth.—Bandon Recorder.
