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COUNTY RETURNS COME IN SLOW BUT CLEARLY INDICATE RESULTS

Peirce and Rackleff Nominated For Representative and Golden Wins For Coroner.

BOWERMAN AND HAWLEY CARRY THE COUNTY.

Anderson Leads Hoy Eighteen in Twenty-Six Precincts—Gettins Well Supported.

Returns from the Coos county primaries Saturday are coming in slow and owing to the failure of many of the election officials to write down the results in the various precincts on the outside of the official returns, the result cannot be ascertained until the official canvass begins in County Clerk Watson's office in Coquille tomorrow.

At 3:30 this afternoon, the returns from all but three of the thirty-six precincts in the county had reached Clerk Watson. The precincts that have not yet reached him are Templeton, South Slough and Missouri. In twenty-six precincts, the total vote on Governor is as follows: Abrahams, 111; Bowerman, 366; Dimick, 233; Hofer, 178.

County Officers. For Coroner, Dr. R. E. Golden, the anti-assembly candidate, seems to have a sure thing. In 26 precincts he has a total of 499, while W. J. Butler, the assembly candidate, has only 339. For Joint Representative, S. P. Peirce, the anti-assembly candidate, has a big lead. In 26 precincts, Peirce's total vote is 376, George N. Perrin's was 297 and Herbert Hume's 141.

For County Representative, Ed. Rackleff, the anti-assembly candidate, has a big lead over George Treadgold, the assembly candidate. In 26 precincts, Rackleff has 491 and Treadgold only 326. The total vote in twenty-six out of the thirty-six precincts gives H. G. Hoy 283 for County Judge and E. A. Anderson, 401.

Other Offices. Ten precincts in Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon, Bunker Hill, Cooston and part of Coquille give the following: For Congress—Hawley, 375; Mulkey, 283.

For Water Commissioner—Chinook, 244; Gettins, 397. For Surveyor—Gould, 363; Kern, 175. For County Commissioner—Armstrong, 239; Oakes, 177; Perkins, 153.

Committeemen Named. The anti-assembly committeemen in two of the three Marshfield precincts were named. Duncan Ferguson in the north and F. E. Allen in the south precincts were both elected. They are both anti-assembly. C. B. Selby, assembly candidate for committeeman in the central precinct, had no opposition and was chosen. The votes on the committeemen were as follows: North Marshfield precinct—Duncan Ferguson, 52; D. L. Buckingham, 25. Central Marshfield precinct—C. B. Selby, 94. South Marshfield precinct—F. E. D. P. STUBBS IN BAD CONDITION

General Agent of Union Pacific Says He Accidentally Shot Himself.

(By Associated Press.) CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 26.—The condition of Donald P. Stubbs, general agent of the Union Pacific Railroad here, son of J. C. Stubbs, vice-president and traffic manager of Harriman lines, to-day is grave. He claims he accidentally shot himself while examining a new revolver. The police believe he attempted suicide.

A. H. Powers, J. H. Flanagan and J. W. Bennett each got a vote for Port Commissioner in Empire. J. W. Bennet also got a vote at Bunker Hill. L. D. Kinney was appointed one of the judges in the south precinct in North Bend. As he is out of the city J. A. Kranick was appointed to serve in his place. George Farrin was appointed to serve in the south precinct of Marshfield, but he did not qualify as he was a candidate. Guy Chamber was appointed a clerk in that precinct. Tom Bennett was named as a clerk in the central precinct but he did not serve. R. O. Graves was appointed to fill a vacancy there. Col. William Grimes got a vote for Port Commissioner.

Apparently R. A. Copple has defeated W. A. Wood for the Democratic nomination for Representative from Coos and Curry counties. From the returns received Thomas Coke has defeated T. P. Hanly for County Commissioner. John F. Hall for County Judge, W. W. Gage for Sheriff and F. W. Stevens for County Surveyor on the Democratic ticket have no opposition. It is reported that R. E. Bedillion of Bandon has received enough votes to nominate him on the Democratic ticket for Representative from Coos county.

THREATENS GOV. BENSON'S LIFE

H. W. Williams Has Been Arrested and It Is Alleged That He Is Insane and Dangerous.

(By Associated Press.) AUBURN, Cal., Sept. 26.—On request of the District Attorney's office of Santa Clara county, H. W. Williams was arrested here to-day on a charge of threatening the life of Governor Benson of Oregon. Governor Benson informed the authorities that Williams frequently threatened his life in letters and telegrams and that he was insane. The Oregon authorities assert Williams is a dangerous maniac and if he cannot be committed to a California asylum

they will ask his return to their jurisdiction. Sheriff McAlley informed the Oregon authorities that Williams has acted in a rational manner since coming to Placer county and that he cannot be examined here for his sanity.

He has been under the care of physicians for four months. He was nominated Saturday at the State primaries for Secretary of State.

The cabinet days will be busy. The long programme of subjects to be considered has been made and each day's sitting is expected to be prolonged. In a general way the discussions are to be on the question of the forthcoming judicial appointments by the President, foreign affairs, including the readjustment in the progress in the Nicaragua reports and estimates and economy plans from the departments, the inauguration of the postal savings banks, and the extension of the civil service to include distance postmasters and permanent money order offices. The only absentee to-day was Dickinson, who is in the far East. It was said that politics will be given little or no consideration at this time.

W. C. Hawley Gets Republican Nomination For Congressman For First District.

Crawford, anti-assembly. School Superintendent, L. R. Alderman, assembly; no opposition. State Printer, W. S. Dunway, anti-assembly. Commissioner of Labor, unsettled. Railroad Commissioner, Frank J. Miller, assembly; no opposition. State Engineer, John H. Lewis, assembly; no opposition.

Democratic Ticket. The democratic ticket nominated was as follows: Governor, Oswald West. Congress, Second District, close between John Manning and the former Mayor of Portland, Harry Lane. First District, Robert Smith. Statement No. 1. The Legislature has a Statement No. 1 majority. According to returns up to noon to-day, A. W. Lafferty, the anti-assembly candidate has defeated W. R. Ellis, the assembly candidate, for the Congressional nomination in the Second District of Oregon. In the First District, the returns indicate that Congressman Hawley will be renominated over B. F. Mulkey by about 2,000. For Supreme Court Justice, it seems that Henry J. Bean of Pendleton, an independent candidate, has defeated Wallace McCamant, the assembly selection. The other justices nominated, according to returns, are Moore, Burnett and McBride. Attorney-General Crawford, an anti-assembly candidate, is apparently easily renominated over J. N. Hart of Baker City, the assembly candidate. It is also believed that W. S. Dunway, the anti-assembly candidate for State Printer, has won over W. J. Clarke, the assembly choice. Returns are slow in coming in and the finals will not be known for another day or two.

CURRY COUNTY. The only returns that are obtainable from Gold Beach, the county seat of Curry county to-day are that Peirce has carried Curry county, which assures his nomination as Joint Representative of Coos and Curry county.
