Body Found Concealed in Cellar (By Associated Press.)
DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 26.—A special from Hoodrich, Ont., says that Elizabeth Anderson, aged sixteen years, was found murdered yesterday in a deserted house in the outskirts of the town. She disappeared yesterday morning shortly after being seen in conversation with a stranger. The body was found in a dark corner of a cellar buried under a pile of clothing. The girl's throat was cut from ear to ear and the body was much mutilated.
