the "Old Guard" and he did it with vengeance. He criticised Roosevelt in unmistakable language and said that since he had occupied the White House he had seen the Republican party divided in every State, he had seen his party candidate overwhelm ingly defeated, business depressed and intelligent and honest working men without employment and hungry, and criticised him sharply fo questioning the decisions of the courts.

Col, Roosevelt laughed at many of Gruber's statements. Some of the delegates hissed Gruber's statement that it could be found that two-thirds of the Roosevelt strength in the convention came from federal office holders. At one point jeers and cat calls became so great Roosevelt leaped to his feet waving hands at the delegates saying, "I ask a full hearing for Col. Gruber," but the hisses did not entirely cease. Comptroller Prendergast was given the floor and congratulated Roosevelt on Gruber's speech. The roll call was 567 for Roosevelt and 455 for Sherman. Roosevelt accepted the nomination in a speech in which he reiterated his recent remarks on the political situation.


