ROOSEVELT IN NEW YORK.

THAT was an interesting bit of news printed in the Associated Press dispatch in the Times last evening, from the Saratoga convention. The developments stirring as they seem were not wholly unexpected. The actions and the results of the Saratoga meeting will have extraordinary bearing on the general elections this fall and two years hence. It is not always that New York commands so prominent a place in the political play of the land though it has, by right of extraordinary population and the eminence of most of its political figures, conspicuous place in the great game. This year, however, there is a tone and group there that are unusually distinguished and attractive, with pending issues inseparably connected with the larger phases of our near political future.

Mr. Roosevelt's return and enrollment in the New York game has lent a significance and force that cannot be overlooked. He is a national figure as well as the commanding factor in the State politics there; and the people of this country have learned to connect his name and policies with their own general calculations so invariably and intimately, that where-soever and whatsoever he leads, has interest for them.

We are glad of this because it is well to have the popular concern centered upon clean and honest men and to be in touch with the best doctrines of thought and action politically. We do not for an instant claim that Mr. Roosevelt is ideally perfect or unsusceptible to mistakes and the failures inherent to his species, but we do claim that he is square and faithful and earnest in his dealings with the people and that they are not to be blamed for pinning their faith to him and keeping their eyes upon him. He may be a politician; he may be working for Roosevelt in a way, but not to the exclusion of the people; his ambitions are honorable and his way of working them out is just a clear and fair and commendable.

His success at Saratoga yesterday will have its weight in swinging of the elections in November. He will sound the rallying note to which every honest partisan in the country may rally and once more become the real leader of real Republicanism in these United States.
