#### North Bend Council Takes Action in Several Cases.

### MINER IS KILLED.

#### Washington Man Meets Mysterious Death in New York.

(By Associated Press.)  
 NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Struck by a bullet at close range, evidently after a struggle, a man believed to be John McDaide, a western mining man, staggered dying into the hallway of a house on Fifth avenue today. He died on the way to the hospital. The police have arrested James Hickey, known as "Kid Seer," who was found nearby wearing a hat believed to have been the victim's. It bears the label of a Ballard, Wash., firm. Papers showed that McDaide belonged to "Moyer's Miners' Union No. 71." Robbery is believed to have been the motive.
