# **GRABS CANNOT** BE SHIPPED OUT

Deputy Game Warden Wright F. P. Norton With Marin Wins Storm Was Quite Severe and Calls Attention to the Special Law.

Deputy Game Warden Cal Wright has notified persons concerned regarding the catching of crabs in Coos Bay. It was understood by the deputy that it was the intention to catch crabs for shipment from this place, so he immediately put a check on it, as it is unlawful. The parties who were understood to have made plans for shipping the crabs were notified that it was unlawful and the Breakwater officials were also no fied that it was unlawful to receive crabs for transportation from here.

There is a special law protecting the crabs in Coos Bay and Mr. Wright calls attention to this. 'I law is as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person within the county of Coes, state of Oregon, or within or upon the waters thereof, including all bays, harbors and inlets of said county. to kill, take, capture or destroy any greater number than fifty salt water crabs in one day; and it shall be ur lawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation within said (by F. P. Norton). Both horses apcounty or upon the waters thereof, to sell or offer for sale, exchaor transport outside of said county, or have in his possession, for the Aside from the liberal purse posted transportation from said county, any that fully \$1,000 was wagered on of the aforesaid salt water crabs; and it shall be unlawful for any people, many of whom had never bsteamboat or express company or P other common carrier or corporation or the officers or agents thereof, or any other person to transport or carry out of said county, or to receive or have in possession for the purpose of such transportation therfrom, any salt water crabs, except for the purpose of exhibition or p pagation; provided that this act sha!" apply to the canning product of salt water crabs within the said county and the exportation of the same therefrom.'

The law means that crabs cannot be shipped from here. They can be cannel but the canned product cannot be shipped out.
