TO LAY OUT AN IDEAL CITY.

The ideal city should be laid out with carefully selected sites for public buildings, schools, colleges, churches, amusement halls, residential areas, business houses, factories, interborough transportation lines and passenger and freight terminals; also docks, bridges, ferries and tunnels, when water courses enter into the problem; and distribution of parks and parkways requires judicious consideration. All should be located in such relation to each other and the surroundings as to provide the people with the safest, most convenient and most satisfying accommodations and, at the same time, present a highly pleasing and artistic appearance, says an exchange. The large parks should be in the outskirts and be left in as natural a state as practicable with their native forest trees. Such paths and lanes as are required, with their bridges, resting nooks, etc., should be judiciously treated to conform, as far as possible, with the natural surroundings. The parks throughout the body of the city, instead of being large and few in number, should be of medium size, plentiful, well distributed and connected, together with numerous parkways of liberal width. This arrangement would give all parts of the city convenient access to the park spaces, which, being thus arranged in a continuous system, could, when once entered, be traversed without leaving it, if desired.

HEWITT WILL FIGHT SUITS

Declares Seymour Bell is Innocent of Wrongdoing in the Matter.

Henry Hewitt, Jr., of Tacoma, declares that Seymour Bell is innocent of wrongdoing and says he will fight the cases. The Oregonian prints the following: "Henry Hewitt, Jr., of the Hewitt Land company of Tacoma, has issued a statement in which he announces his determination to fight for the retention of the Baker county timber lands he is accused of having obtained as the result of a conspiracy to defraud the government. "Mr. Hewitt declares that there is no earthly chance for the government to prove fraud in connection with the actions of his company by any 'lying witness.' The Tacoma land and timber magnate intimates that the conspiracy to defraud is being sprung by the government and that special agents of the land department have induced witnesses to come forward against the Hewitt Land company because the original locators have been made to believe that they sold out for too little money. Hewitt Defies Accusers. "In the interview, Mr. Hewitt said: "There is no earthly chance for fraud under any condition and fraud cannot be proved unless it be by lying witnesses. I notice names of Rose A. Call, Jennie Tietjen and a whole lot more mentioned whom I never heard of and haven't the slightest idea who they are. "I don't even know exactly where the lands are but I surmise the suit has been started on representation of persons who sold their lands and took offense because they found the Hewitt Land company had bought the land so cheap. My guess is these people have been making false statements. Buying Held as Regular. "I bought all the land second-

handed, that is, from the persons who had filed on it and had a right to sell if they wanted to. Seymour Bell and my son, William Hewitt, did most of the buying, but it was all done from the record after the lands had been cruised and properly recorded. "I have an idea that this suit concerns some land we bought of J. B. Stoddard. There were between 3000 and 4000 acres in the deal and half of a sawmill owned by Stoddard. These properties were deeded over to us in the regular way after we had put up money against them and were operated by the Sumpter Lumber company. Stoddard had purchased the lands from the original owners, who, in turn, had secured them from the government and the patents stand in our possession and speak for themselves. Charges Conspiracy. "Assistant United States Attorney Evans, in charge of the litigation, last night called attention to the coincidence of the 'idea' announced by Mr. Hewitt and the facts charged in the complaint. "Mr. Hewitt struck it right the very first guess," said Mr. Evans. "The government has charged a conspiracy between J. B. Stoddard and Seymour Bell, whereby the lands they procured through locators who represented them were transferred to the Hewitt Land company. "In closing his statement for the public, Mr. Hewitt said: "I am absolutely certain that they can't touch an acre of that Oregon land and if there is any earthly show of fraud, I don't know of it. What I do object to is being made to appear like a timber lands thief. I've been buying timber lands more than twenty years and my transactions are entirely open to the government's inspection. Just because people who file on government lands sell their holdings and then try to stir up trouble when they get to thinking about the price at which they sold, is no reason to go around hollering fraud about the man who bought."
