TO ENFORCE ANTI-SPITTING LAWS.

MINNEAPOLIS is about to inaugurate an exterminating warfare upon the spitting habit, not only because it is a nuisance, but spurred on by the sense of menace to health. The Minneapolis ordinance is exceedingly broad in its reach. It covers the throwing or dropping of stools of cigars or cigarettes or of the offensive quids of tobacco, which are less a menace to health than they are offensive to every sense of cleanliness and decency. It makes it unlawful to spit or throw stubs or quids upon the floorway, stairway or any part of a public building or upon the sidewalk of any street, avenue or parkway.

This is a sane and entirely reasonable and commendable city law and it is hoped that Minneapolis will enforce it to the limit. One or two striking examples will work miracles. The law involves no hardships and its enforcement will so make for health and cleanliness that protest will not have a leg to stand upon. The splitter has no public place outside of a back alley and even there he is a nuisance and a menace. Marshfield should follow the excellent example of Minneapolis.

COURT HEARS BOOM CASE

Suit of Bernitt and Wittig Against Smith-Powers Company Is Up.

The case of Bernitt and Wittig against the Smith-Powers Logging company was heard in the federal court at Portland. A receivership is asked for, but it is only in relation to that particular log boom and does not apply to the whole affair of the company as might be wrongly assumed from the nature of the proceeding. In regard to the case the Oregonian says:

The application of E. W. Bernitt and Victor Wittig for a receiver for the Smith-Powers Logging company was heard yesterday afternoon in the private chambers of United States Judge Wolverton.

The defendant company is one of the largest lumber companies on the Pacific coast, its president being Charles A. Smith of Minneapolis. The company is operating in Coos county, in the vicinity of Marshfield, where the headquarters are, and where it owns one of the largest lumber mills on the west coast.

Bernitt and Wittig were pioneers of the logging industry of the Coos Bay district, and assert that long prior to the time that Smith and his associates made their advent in that territory they acquired an interest in a logging boom valued at \$1500. When the Smith interests went into the Marshfield district, they bought the rights of the old companies, and after applying to the war department for permission to maintain the boom, in which Bernitt & Wittig claimed an interest, proceeded to enlarge it and take possession. It is also contended that they bought all the paraphernalia necessary to the operation of the boom.

For the defense Attorney Goss asserted that the Smith interests had never been apprised that Bernitt and Wittig owned an interest in the log boom business, and denied that any evidence of partnership in the concern was in existence. Abstracts of the properties are said to have failed to show that the plaintiffs were interested in the boom in question.
