They stop for a short time generally around the sand hill lakes and then go to the interior.

**Building New Boat**—Olsen and Christensen are building a new gasoline boat at Empire. It will be fitted with a 50-horsepower gasoline engine and will be a sea-going boat suitable for making the small ports of the coast.

**Trolling Good**—Many from Marshfield and North Bend were on the lower bay Sunday enjoying the sport of trolling for salmon. The fishing was good and some of the sportsmen succeeded in catching six or seven big salmon for their day's sport.

**Short of Cans**—The cannery at Empire is not receiving any more fish right now as the plant is short of cans and cannot take any more salmon until another consignment of cans is received. Saturday the plant put up 299 cases of canned salmon.

**To Roseburg**—Representative Marshall of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company arrived in Roseburg last evening after a few days spent at Coos Bay points. He will remain in town for several days looking after the company's interests.—Roseburg News.

**Apples Defective**—Fruit Inspector P. M. Hall-Lewis yesterday ordered nine boxes of apples shipped down by Ivy Condron to Marshfield, returned to the grower because many of them were defective. By having the fruit returned to the grower, the loss is reduced, as the good fruit can be sorted out and marketed.

**Repairing Telephone Lines**—The telephone line from North Bend to Empire is being repaired. During the forest fires it was damaged a good deal and since then the service has been bad. New cross arms are being put in place on some of the poles and the line will be made first class throughout.
