SHERMAN STAGE IS CHARGED WITH ENTICING GIRL AWAY

Warrant Sworn Out For Him in Stella Culbertson Case at North Bend.

NO TRACE FOUND OF EITHER OF THEM

Sheriff Gage and Officers Throughout County Continue the Search.

Mr. Culbertson of Bangor, the father of fourteen-year-old Stella Culbertson who has mysteriously disappeared, this morning swore out a warrant in Justice Shuster's court at North Bend, charging Sherman Stage with enticing her from home. No trace of either Stage or the girl has been found so far, although Sheriff Gage and all the officers in the county are hunting vigorously for them. Stage's father still maintains that his son left on the Breakwater last Saturday, two days before the Culbertson girl left home, for Washington points.

Mr. Culbertson and his wife are almost distracted as a result of their inability to find any trace of their daughter. Mr. Culbertson has made a vigorous search of North Bend and Marshfield and has communicated with all the friends of the family in this section but he has not been able to find anyone who has heard from or who has seen his daughter since she left home Monday morning to attend school.

Various reports are in circulation concerning the matter, but as usual in such cases they are not founded on facts.

BROKERS GO BROKE.

New York Commission House Makes an Assignment.

The firm has a membership on the Exchange.

FOUR KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

FLIGHT MADE IN WASHINGTON

English Aviator Demonstrates Flying Machine's Success in National Capital.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Claude Graham White, an English aviator, today flew from the Benning race track to Washington, a distance of three miles, and made a successful landing in Executive avenue, between the White House, State, Navy and War buildings.

The flight was made for the purpose of paying his respects to General Allen, chief signal officer of the army. It caused considerable excitement and business in the government buildings was temporarily suspended.

Smith, a wealthy druggist of Norwich, Conn., who came to Alaska to hunt big game, and Alfred Lowell, the eldest son of one of the founders of this place, were drowned in Lake Kenai, Oct. 11, while returning from a moose hunt. With William Walker, a guide, they were crossing Lake Small in a dory and encountered a storm. Waves swamped the boat 150 feet from shore. The bodies were recovered.

QUAIL HUNTER IS WOUNDED

Rudolph Amstein, Formerly of Coos Bay, Injured in California.

Word has just been received here of a serious accident that befell Rudolph Amstein, formerly a well known Coos Bay man, at Pacific Grove, Calif., which may result in the loss of the sight of one eye.

According to the letter which was just received by Mautzey Brothers, with whom he was formerly engaged in the laundry business here, Mr. Amstein and a friend went quail hunting in the vicinity of Pacific Grove. They separated and a flock of quail arose between them. The friend fired and the load of shot struck Mr. Amstein, who had been concealed behind some small bushes. Many of the shot penetrated his forehead and face. He was quickly taken to town but he was faint from loss of blood before a physician could be secured.

He is getting along as well as could be expected, but it will be some time before it can be determined whether the wounds will leave any permanent injuries.

IS INDICTED FOR BRIBERY

Frank J. Gardner of Brooklyn, Former Legislator, Held For Crime.

FRAUD IN ART IS DISCOVERED

New York Importers Arrested For Under-Valuation of Masterpieces.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Customs officials are actively engaged in examining works of art displayed in the galleries of Duven Brothers, art dealers and antiquarians, two members of which firm, Henry J. Duven and Benjamin Duven, were arrested yesterday charged with defrauding the government of custom duties by means of under valuation, which District Attorney Wise said would amount to many thousands of dollars. The United States government has warrants out for the remainder of the firm, who have art galleries in the leading cities of Europe.

Millions of dollars worth of paintings and art works have been sold to millionaire art patrons in this country and it was suggested today that the customs officials may invade these art collections and temporarily hold the masterpieces pending the adjudication of alleged frauds. Wise said the fraudulent valuations have been carried on for many years.

CHARLTON IS TURNED OVER

Federal Authorities to Pass on Extradition to Italy of Wife Slayer.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Porter Charlton, confessed murderer of his wife, Mrs. Mary Scott-Castle-Charlton, today was ordered turned over to the federal authorities in the proceedings which have been instituted for his extradition to Italy. Judge Black of the New Jersey supreme court made the order.

BOMBS FOUND NEAR EMBASSY

Paris Strike Waning and Attempted Crime Laid to Agitators.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) PARIS, Oct. 14.—A powerful bomb was discovered by the police today at the foot of a tree in the avenue near the American embassy. The officers attribute the attempted outrage to anarchists who sought to put new ginger into an apparently dying railroad strike. The missile was taken to a laboratory where an examination showed its deadly character.

FIND TRACE OF MISSING MAN

Expect Indictments at Portland For Ill-Treatment of Dr. Stemler.

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—For more than an hour R. M. Tuttle, business manager of the Crystal Springs asylum, where Dr. Laurel A. Stemler was tortured by J. G. Arnold, the head attendant, was in the custody of Foreman Young and Clerk Wallace, of the county grand jury. During that period he was not allowed out of their sight, lest he communicate with any of his employees at the Mount Tabor institution. Tuttle was witness before the grand jury yesterday and was questioned as regards the methods in vogue in the private asylum conducted by Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, Dr. Robert L. Gillespie and himself. Whether Tuttle made an admission putting the jury on the track of certain information it desired to procure, or whether he asserted his inability to enlighten the inquisitors further as to some phase of the investigation is not known.

In any event, when the noon recess was taken, Foreman Young and Clerk Wallace took charge of Tuttle and proceeded directly to the Crystal Springs asylum, where they interviewed a guard relative to his knowledge of Arnold's whereabouts. This man is said to have informed them that Arnold is still in hiding in or near Vancouver, Wash. Last Saturday, he said, Arnold telephoned him to come to Vancouver. He went there and was told by the assailant of Dr. Stemler that he might be captured and taken before the grand jury and in such case he would like advice as to what he should say.

According to this guard Arnold is either unable to leave Vancouver because of lack of funds or fears that the trains are being watched and that he will be apprehended if he is seen by the Vancouver authorities. The guard appeared as a witness before the jury this morning, but whether he divulged any more than he is reported to have informed the foreman and the clerk yesterday can not be ascertained.

Tuttle was again a witness before the jury this morning, testifying from the time the guard left the inquisitorial chamber until the noon recess. He evidently keenly appreciates the position in which he is placed, having to bear the entire burden of the institution in the temporary absence of Drs. Coe and Gillespie.

It is admitted by the authorities that the heads of the institution also may be indicted for the cruel treatment of Dr. Stemler.

John Anderson "Cornered" by Ben Mathison and Forced to Reveal Theft.

ROOM IS FOUND FULL OF GARMENTS

Women's Clothing of All Kinds Found—Believed to Be Kleptomaniac.

John Anderson, a young man employed in the sorting sheds at the C. A. Smith mill, was arrested this afternoon by Acting Marshal Levi Smith on the charge of purloining a varied assortment of women's clothing during the last few months. His room at the Bunker Hill Boarding House was found to be almost filled with women's wearing apparel. Anderson's arrest followed the discovery by Ben Mathison, one of the mill foremen, that Anderson had stolen some women's clothing from the Mathison home last evening. Anderson visited a friend who is boarding at the Mathison home. Later, after his departure, it was found that some valuable new clothing of Miss Mathison's had disappeared.

This morning Mr. Mathison "cornered" Anderson and charged him with the theft. It resulted in Anderson going and getting the clothes and returning them.

Then others searched Anderson's room and found a box filled with women's clothing and also a dresser full of it. Some of it was new, some clean as though it had just been washed and some of it looked as though it had been taken from the "dirty clothes" bag.

When this was discovered, Ward M. Blake of the company telephoned to Levi Smith for an officer to come and get Anderson. Mr. Smith appealed to Justice Pennoek and Constable Cox, but they would not act unless some one appeared and swore out a warrant against Anderson. Finally Mr. Smith took the case into his own hands. Anderson is said to be rather weak minded and is alleged to be a kleptomaniac.

It is believed that he is the one who has stolen the large amount of clothing that has disappeared from clothes lines in Marshfield during the last several months.

TWENTY-NINE ARE MISSING

Many Bodies of Colorado Mine Disaster Victims not Yet Recovered.
