Would Run.—Will E. Dungan is having petitions circulated to place his name on the ballot as an independent candidate for county coroner at the November election. Dr. R. E. Golden, the present coroner, is the only other candidate in the field.

Meet Saturday.—Chairman C. B. Selby has called a meeting of republicans to be held at the Chamber of Commerce Saturday evening for the purpose of injecting more spirit into the campaign and to insure the success of the republican ticket in the November election.

Had Hard Trip.—Otto Stevens of North Bend was a passenger on the stage from Marshfield Tuesday night, and with other travelers rode all day in one of the hardest rains that has visited this section in months. Mr. Stevens will continue his journey to Glendale today.—Roseburg News.

Receive Tombstones.—Baker Post No. 8, G. A. R., has received six tombstones from the government to mark the graves of veterans. These are furnished free by the government. As soon as bases can be arranged for, Commander Thorp will arrange for special exercises to erect the markers.

To Build Wharf.—At a meeting at Cooson this week a project was launched to build a wharf there 80x400 feet and to dredge from the present channel to the county road landing. The project will cost about \$2000 and will be voted upon at the next election, the plan being to tax the property owners of the district for it.

Had Narrow Escape.—A story of a rather narrow escape which Ole Johnson, L. M. Holmberg and Hugo Quist, all employes of the C. A. Smith Lumber company, had last Sunday has just come to light. They were fishing on Coos river when in some manner their boat caught on fire. The blaze spread rapidly and it was only after hard paddling they got the launch into shallow water where they could subdue the flames. The accident was caused by the solder melting off the feed pipe and it

is a wonder that their gasoline tank did not explode.

Made Quick Trip.—The Narn Smith will sail this afternoon with a large cargo of lumber for Bay Point. On the last trip, General Superintendent Meehan won a box of cigars on her speed. When she left, he bet the cigars that she would be back here and loading inside of seven days. By exactly two minutes he won the bet, the first sling of lumber being put aboard that long before the expiration of the seven days.

Potatoes Dearer.—F. S. Dow, who returned yesterday from San Francisco, reports that potatoes are likely to bring a high price this fall and winter and says that it will pay Coos county growers to hold theirs awhile. He reports that a big portion of the California crop cannot be kept for winter, many thousands of bushels having already decayed, although the growers there are shipping them to Oregon and every place else where they can find a quick market.

Smith Coming.—R. G. Smith of Grants Pass is expected here soon to make several speeches in behalf of his candidacy for congress. He is the democratic nominee to oppose Congressman Hawley. The local democrats will meet Monday to arrange for a more active campaign.

Pays Fine.—Del Saunders has paid a fine of \$25 and costs in Justice Pennock's court for shooting a duck out of a boat. The complaint was filed by Deputy Game Warden Cal Wright. Saunders talked of fighting the case, claiming that the duck was a wounded one, but finally decided not to.

Had Long Walk.—Friends of Jas. Watson and Hank Wells are laughing over a good joke on the two yesterday. They returned from Portland on the Breakwater and when the vessel docked at Empire, there were no launches in sight, so they thought they would get off and walk to Marshfield and beat the other passengers in. They felt as though they wanted the exercise and started over the old trail. In some way or other they got lost and walked in vain for an hour or more until they finally located the pumping station and were put on the right trail into Marshfield, reaching here after all the other passengers.
