Marshfield School Notes

The class in physics is studying the mechanics of fluids.

Spelling is a regular study in the high school this year.

Several works of art now adorn the walls of the South Marshfield school.

The reports at the end of the first three weeks show 552 pupils in actual attendance.

An interesting exercise in chapel Tuesday morning was a quotation contest between pupils and teachers.

Teachers of fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades will meet on the second Monday of each school month in Mrs. Rood's room at 4 o'clock.

General teachers' meeting on the last Monday of each school month in the high school assembly room at 4 o'clock.

Other works of art recently secured are "Sir Gallahad," "The Terror of the Desert," and Rosa Bonheur's "Plowing."

The following schedule of meetings for Marshfield teachers was adopted at a recent meeting of the superintendent and principals:

The crowded condition of the lower grade rooms has made another teacher imperative. Such teacher will be given a second grade in the South Marshfield building.

Teachers of the first, second and third grades will meet on the first Monday of each school month in Mrs. Wilbur's room at 3 o'clock.

The chemistry class has so far studied three of the thirty-seven most common elements. The elements studied were made by each individual student in the laboratory.

Students of zoology are about to begin the dissection of the clam. During the past week the earth worm has been the subject of study. In the laboratory the students learn by doing.

The commercial department offers courses in bookkeeping, stenography, commercial arithmetic and commercial geography. The department is for use. Its equipment and apparatus are for service. Use it.

The high school is offering a course in zoology this semester. The course should prove a very profitable one. The country about Marshfield offers a bountiful supply of material for just this kind of work. Pupils of many an inland school

would be envious indeed if they knew the great supply of marine forms that pupils of Marshfield schools have right here at hand, just for the getting. Material that costs eastern schools trouble and money to procure, our schools have in great quantity and entirely without cost. This section of country offers exceptional opportunities to students of science. Select any science you please and the natural advantages are great.

The principal's office at the Central School has been given a fitting out. Floor paint, varnish, some new curtains and a new rug have made a real transformation. Most of the work was done by boys of the seventh grade—a sort of manual training.

The students in Miss Montgomery's German classes have organized a club for the study of things "German." The club will meet twice a month at the homes of its members. The programs are suggestive and interesting.

Grades six and seven of the South Marshfield school have been holding spelling contests to determine the championship of the room. Victory hangs in the balance most of the time. The room possesses some excellent spellers.

Report cards will be sent out from all grades in the schools on Wednesday, October 19th. Parents are respectfully urged to inspect them and see that pupils return them to their teachers as soon as possible. Co-operation should be our motto. If things are not going right have a talk with the teacher and endeavor to find out what is wrong.

A beautiful piece of work representing a scene from the frieze of the Parthenon adorns the front wall of the high school room. This was the gift of the class of 1910. Such gifts are a real treasure. They clothe the walls with fine pictures but they do more than clothe them with pleasant memories. The custom should be encouraged. One school wherein this custom prevails has accumulated some splendid pictures during the past ten years.

A movement is under way to organize a High School association among the high schools of Coos county. Its purpose will be the promotion of right ideals in athletics, oratory and debating, and to facilitate the attainment of the same through co-operation. Superintendents Ostein of Bandon, Hockett of Coquille and Tiedgen of Marshfield constitute a committee to formulate a constitution for the organization. A meeting to adopt a constitution will be held at Coquille October 15th.

The Oregon Mining and Timber Journal of Portland prints quite a complimentary account of the Coos Bay country. Editorially the paper says:

"In this number of the Mining and Timber Journal we have a great deal to say about the Coos Bay country. We cannot say too much.
