This position has been undergoing a change and with the new ideals in politics is also coming an awakened sense of duty and responsibility by public service corporations that is to be commended and complimented. One of the first apostles in the new creed of courtesy in comferce is Mr. Arthur S. Huey, vice-president of H. M. Byllesby & Co., of Chicago, owners of The Coos Bay Gas and Electric Company. The Times has heretofore referred to Mr. Huey's wise policy of treating the public as partners in the corporations with which he is connected. This latest action of Mr. Huev proves him to be in carnest in his efforts to inculcate the newsdidea that a public utility is a public trust. He has recently issued a circular to all employes of the ompany in which he addresses them as follows:

"Under these circumstances, you must realize that you can do your lie utility management, full duty to your employer only by doing your full duty to the people of the municipality where you are occupied.

"The employe who serves our company best is the employe who serves the public best.

"This applies to all departments of the operating organizationequally to the managers, the stokers at the gas works, the trainmen on their cars, the engineers at the power houses, the men in the office. and those engaged in construction and other outside duties.

"To a great extent our organization is judged by the manners of its employes. Therefore, you must cultivate genuine courtesy and exercise patience and forbearance on all occasions.

"Those details of service which the public has a right to know, while perfectly familiar to yourself, are often not understood by the men and women with whom you come into contact.

"Part of your duty is to reply to inquiries for information politely and comprehensively. If you are unable to supply the information your self, the inquirer should be personally conducted (whenever possible) to the person in authority who
