

STREET WORK IS TAKEN UP

better workmen could be obtained for \$2.50 or \$2.75 per day, the workmen in the cities being more familiar with the work. He said that if anyone could do the filling for thirty cents per yard or near it, he would be glad to submit it. Furthermore, he said it costs the company seven per cent to market the special improvement bonds that they have to take on the street work and this has to be added to the cost of the work. Finally on Mr. Coke's motion, the bid was rejected as being excessive. This was after City Attorney Goss held that the bid could not be verbally reduced by Mr. Whitmore to come within the estimate of the city engineer.

North Front Street.

An ordinance providing for paving North Front street was passed. Councilman Nelson voted against it, thereby eliminating the emergency clause and causing a delay of thirty days in asking for bids. Mayor Straw grew irate at this, declaring that the street in its present condition was a disgrace to the city and dangerous to the public. He declared that he would order Street Commissioner Lawhorne to fence it off so that no one could travel it until it is fixed. The North Front street paving and fill, etc., will cost \$17,119.86.

An ordinance providing for the grading of the alley in South Marshfield along the property of J. F. Juzo, Gus Adelsperger, C. R. Peck and others was adopted.

Other Street Work.

An ordinance providing for the sale of several thousand dollars worth of special improvement bonds was passed.

The improvement of Seventh and Ninth streets was accepted.

The Market avenue wharf was accepted and Noble Brothers ordered paid \$300 on their contract.

The contractors on the various jobs were ordered paid the following amounts: North Front street, \$122.50; Hall avenue, \$100; Elrod, \$100; Ninth street, \$300; West Marshfield sewer, \$75.

Street Commissioner Lawhorne was instructed to have the roadway from Hall avenue to the cemetery improved with either plank or burned clay. This action was taken on Walter Condon's request.

MUCH LIQUOR STILL SOLD

Prohibition Proves a Failure in Manitoba In Preventing Sale of Liquor.

A recent press dispatch from Winnipeg, Manitoba, says: "Though the Temperance party of Manitoba has published maps which show that in at least half the province it is illegal to sell liquor, local option is considered a failure so far as lessening the sale of liquor is concerned. 'The act is very stringent, but the fact that it is not enforced is at once apparent to even a casual visitor in one of the prohibition areas or towns. The 'dry' districts literally reek with whisky, good and bad, mostly the latter. The various temperance hotels always have a good supply of different liquors on hand. It is openly asserted that as much liquor is sold in a prohibition town as in a 'wide-open' town of the same size. 'When a municipality has gone 'dry' it has been noticed that the young men who occasionally used to take a drink of beer when there was a hotel often become inveterate whisky drinkers. They cannot get beer, as the 'blind pigs' sell nothing but spirits on account of its smaller bulk. Surely but quickly the people of Manitoba are beginning to realize that 'prohibition does not prohibit.' (Paid advertisement by Anti-Prohibition League.)
