Roseburg Auto Thieves, Caught in Marshfield, Sentenced.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 20.—Ralph Casey and Chick Wright alleged automobile thieves, who were recently convicted of stealing a red run-around belonging to the Harding Land Company, were sentenced to 5 years each in the state penitentiary by Judge Coke in the circuit court. Neither of the men appeared affected by the sentence, and smiled as they were led from the court room.

BUILDING AT MYRTLE POINT.

Many New Structures Erected There This Year.

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., Oct. 20.—Quite a number of new houses are being erected in Myrtle Point and vicinity. The Dement residence which is one of the handsomest in the county is nearly completed. Dan Belleu, who recently rented his large cattle ranch to California cattle men, is building a fine residence at the edge of town. A number of other new houses have been erected in town and several new houses established on the Roseburg stage road, extending the built up area of the city considerably. A new sewer system is also being built in Myrtle Point.

QUARREL OVER WOMAN.

Assaultant of Stanley Ketchel Gives Excuse For Crime.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Oct. 20.—Walter A. Hurtz, who shot and killed Stanley Ketchel, was captured at the home of Thomas Haggard, one mile from Niagara, Mo. Hurtz was taken to the Webster county jail at Marshfield, where he is being closely guarded.

Hurtz, in telling the story of the shooting, asserted that Ketchel made insulting remarks to Goldie Smith, a cook employed at the farm. He said words passed between Ketchel and himself and he then demanded that the pugilist throw up his hands. When the champion refused to do this Hurtz declared he was so frightened, knowing Ketchel carried a revolver, that he fired, and without fully realizing what he had done, fled.

Local officers assert that Ketchel's slayer admitted that his real name was Walter Duple; that his home was at Webb City, Mo., and that he was a deserter from the United States army.
