WILL BE TRANSFERRED.

Captain Emery, Inspector, is to go to North Carolina.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21.—Captain Howard Emery, inspector of the Thirteenth Life-saving District, with headquarters at Portland, has been apprised by the Department of his early transfer to Newbern, N. C., where he will have command of the United States revenue cutter Pamlico Sounds. His successor at Portland in the life-saving service will be Captain J. H. Quinan, master of the revenue cutter Tahoma, which has been stationed in Bering Sea the past summer. The new inspector is expected to arrive from the north very shortly. After his arrival the present inspector will leave for the Atlantic coast. As yet the new commander of the Tahoma has not been announced.

Captain Emery has had charge of the Thirteenth Life-saving district for the past three years, the full term one serves in that capacity. Consequently the order for the transfer was expected. During the greater part of his term of service as inspector Captain Emery resided at Portland, where he made many friends.

OFFER BOAT TO BANDON.

Owners of Golden Gate Make Proposition.
The Bandon Recorder says: L. B. Branstetter of Portland, who is chief owner and manager of the steamer Golden Gate, and Capt. Levi Snyder, met with the business men of Bandon Saturday night to talk over the proposition of putting the Golden Gate on the regular run between Portland and the Coquille river. Mr. Branstetter's proposition was to sell a controlling interest in the boat to Bandon people and have a board of directors or managers appointed, three of whom should be Bandon people, and thus operate the boat between here and Portland with Capt. Snyder as master.

The boat is rather small, being only 116 feet long, but has cabin room for 28 passengers, 20 of whom can have staterooms on the upper deck, which would probably be the carrying capacity of the boat as the lower deck cabins would probably be blocked by the packing of freight in the boat. The boat is said to have a speed of 10 knots an hour, which is fast enough for coast trade.

At present the Golden Gate is plying between Portland and Tillamook, but Mr. Branstetter prefers to run here owing to the fact that the Tillamook bar is not very dependable in the winter. The object Mr. Branstetter had in view was to carry coal from this river to Portland, and Mr. Gage, superintendent of the Riverton mines, who was also present at the meeting, says the company can furnish enough coal to keep two or three boats running, and Portland people are anxious to get the coal. Mr. Branstetter asked that if Bandon people did not want to buy an interest in the boat, that they guarantee 125 tons each way if he would put the boat on the run, but neither proposition was definitely decided upon Saturday night.
