

SUIT IS BEGUN FOR BIG SUM

Dr. Stemler's Relatives Sue Portland Institution For \$100,000 for Cruelty.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20.—Suit to recover damages in the amount of \$100,000, with costs and disbursements of action, from the Sanitarium Company, which consists of Dr. R. L. Gillespie, Dr. Henry Waldo Coe and R. M. Tuttle, because of the alleged brutality and torture subjected at the Crystal Springs asylum, was filed in Circuit Court this morning by H. E. Stemler, brother of the maltreated man and guardian of his person and estate.

Sensational charges are made by the plaintiff in the document, which was drafted by Attorney John F. Logan. With him in the action are associated Judge Henry E. McGinn, Judge Thomas O'Day and Attorney Wilfrid E. Farrell. The latter was counsel for Mrs. Hannah Purser, whose release as a prisoner at Crystal Springs was obtained last October by habeas corpus proceedings before Circuit Judge Earl C. Bronaugh, and for Louis Turjon, whose suit to recover \$25,000 damages last winter because of alleged brutal treatment by Crystal Springs attendants was blocked by legal technicalities opposed by the company's lawyers.

It is charged that the mental and physical suffering due to the unlawful acts of employees of the asylum was not confined to Dr. Stemler, but that the plaintiff, his guardian, was so shocked on discovering the cruelties and indignities which the weak-minded patient was forced to endure that he was reduced to a state necessitating the services of a physician.

During the times mentioned in the complaint, according to allegation, the sanitarium company had in its employ "incompetent, cruel and brutal attendants," whom it knowingly hired and retained in its service. This charge, the plaintiff's attorneys assert, they will easily be able to demonstrate when the proper time arrives.

What will be the outcome of grand jury investigation which is being carried on cannot be prophesied. Its members have conducted their work vigorously, going in person to the institution with physicians of their own choosing, and have sent out of the city for witnesses said to be in possession of facts as to the conduct of affairs at Crystal Springs.

TO PROTECT BIRDS.

Wm. L. Finley Offers Plan to Prevent Extirpation.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21.—Federal protection for migratory birds during their flights must be had if these feathered creatures are not to be exterminated, says William L. Finley of Portland, a widely known ornithologist. Mr. Finley is a bird authority whose researches have been prosecuted from the Atlantic to the Pacific, as well as abroad. He is a lecturer for the National Association of Audubon societies of New York City.

He favors the establishment of government or state reservations that shall be retreats for wild birds. These areas, he suggests, may be established on private estates where the owners are willing and placed in charge of good game keepers who shall prohibit all shooting. Song and game birds, he believes, will thus become abundant in these refuges and will spread out and populate the surrounding country.

Mr. Finley has just returned from California, where he visited the state game farm at Haywards. There he found the state has gone into the business of raising pheasants, which are furnished to farmers and others for propagation, the young being liberated in favorable places throughout the state.

"Pheasant farming offers splendid profit paying opportunities right here in Oregon," said Mr. Finley, "for the climate is well adapted for this business. Pheasants are hardy birds and can be raised about as easily as chickens, while there is much profit in them. Since the numbers of our wild pheasants are being depleted, the state will eventually have to close the season on these birds entirely, or else secure new birds for restocking the fields and woods. If farmers in different parts of the state would raise pheasants, a part of the game fund could well be spent in buying and releasing these birds."
