BARBER'S CLOSE CALL.

Race Horse Man Known On Coos Bay Nearly Cremated. Graf Barber, the well-known Grants Pass racehorse handler, who was at the races here this summer, came near being one of the victims of the Shanko fire which destroyed nearly all of the business section of that little town early last Friday morning. He was awakened in his room in the hotel by the roar of burning timbers and found the building in flames. The smoke was so dense and suffocating that he had difficulty in getting out of his room, he having barely time to gather his clothing and run under the flames. The man who perished in the flames occupied the next room to Mr. Barber.

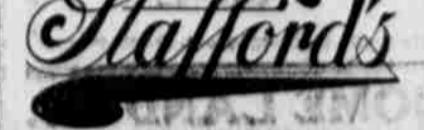
