Dr. W. W. Vanderburgh Injured By Automobile In San Francisco.
Word has just been received here of a serious accident which befell Dr. W. W. Vanderburgh, a former Coos county man, at San Francisco. He was reared here and is a nephew of J. J. Clinkinbeard and W. B. Piper of Coos River. Concerning the accident, a San Francisco paper says: "Dr. W. W. Vanderburgh, a well-known osteopathist of this city, whose home is at 1027 Green street, was seriously injured last evening when his automobile, from which he had alighted to crank, started off at the bottom of the hill at Leavenworth and Vallejo streets and ran over him. He received severe spinal injuries, which may result in making him a cripple."
"Dr. J. K. Pihnez of 1896 Leavenworth street was a witness of the accident and treated Dr. Vanderburgh at his home. He said that the injuries of the latter are severe."
