### DEER SEASON OVER.

Monday Will Be Last Day That Venison Can Legally Be Secured. Deputy Game Warden Cal. Wright calls attention of hunters and others to the fact that the open season for deer will be over Monday, October 31. He cautions hunters to remember this as the law is very strict. Mr. Wright also calls the attention of non-resident hunters to the fact that shooting ducks out of a boat is prohibited and that the limit is thirty-five a week and that the limit of shore, wading birds or snipe is fifty per week. Also that night shooting is prohibited at all times.
