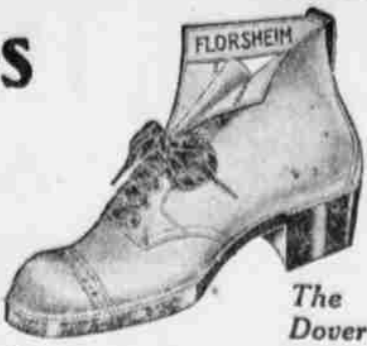

Coos County Will Be Represented In Hill Railway Exhibition Car.

Coos county will be represented in the exhibition car of Oregon products which the Hill lines will send throughout the East this fall and winter by five sample boxes of apples which are bound to make the thousands of easterners who will see them look twice with wonderment. The apples are now on exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.

Some time ago, the Chamber of Commerce was requested by the Hill lines to contribute something that could be shown in the "Oregon Exhibition Car" and P. M. Hall-Lewis, fruit inspector, was asked to secure some apples. He did so and personally packed them. They are not unusually large apples but are a fair sample of the regular commercial apple and prettier fruit would be hard to secure anywhere.
