

COOS COUNTY'S DEBT \$113,000

Unpaid Warrants Total That Sum According to Clerks' Report.

According to the semi-annual report of County Clerk Watson, the total debt of Coos County, September 30, 1910, is \$113,549.33. Of this, \$100,399.49 is unpaid general fund warrants, \$6,025.96 is interest on them \$7,106.78 is unpaid county road warrants.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "County Treasurer Dimmick has received the receipt from the state treasurer for \$16,000.00 which was forwarded to Salem last week. This represents the final payment of the state taxes for this county for the year 1909. The total tax for the year was \$33,471, the first installment having been sent to Salem in April."

WOMAN SUFFRAGE IN COLORADO
Mrs. Frances W. Goddard of Colorado Springs, a noted worker for educational and philanthropic causes, no longer believes in "votes for women."

"In an interview in May in the Providence (Mass.) Sunday Journal, she says: 'I have voted since 1893. I have been delegate to City and State Conventions and if I am sent to the next State Convention I shall go. I have been a deputy sheriff and a watcher at the polls, and a member of the Republican State Committee from El Paso County. As long as I have the franchise, I consider it a duty to vote, but I would abolish the privilege tomorrow if I could, and so would the best men.'

The tendency of women to bring the personal element into everything, Mrs. Goddard contends, is one of the chief elements of their failure as voters. Another element is the tendency of women not to "stay out." She says, "I have known women who worked for the Republican party one year to work for the Democrats the next, stating quite frankly that, 'the Democrats gave us more money.'"

And more than one woman has replied to me, when I asked her how she was going to vote, that 'she didn't know till she had asked her husband.'

Mrs. Goddard has been in the midst of the fight and she considers that as a factor for righteousness, woman suffrage in Colorado is a failure, and that the price women must pay is too great.

Besides her political offices, Mrs. Goddard is vice-president for Colorado of Mothers' Congress; second vice-president of Y. W. C. A. of Colorado Springs; First Vice-President of Boys' Clubs; Trustee of City Federation of Women's Clubs; President of Humane Society and only woman member on anti-tuberculosis committee of Colorado Springs. tory. I do know of several instances where families have refused to move to Black Rock on account of the boot-legging and blind pigs. The town of Black Rock has become demoralized and tough during the last year under the present law. Prohibition has made sneaks and law-breakers out of many young men and boys.

"Local option and licensed saloons would mean a dry town in Black Rock, and probably well-regulated saloons in Falls City.

"The loose saloon and protected rooms, under loose laws, is damnable; but prohibition, without enforcement of the law, (and enforcement seems impossible,) is much worse. The lesser of the two evils is the licensed saloon, under proper regulation."

Mr. Gerlinger's answer so effectively disposes of the irresponsible assertion made by the Enterprise that no further comment would seem necessary.
