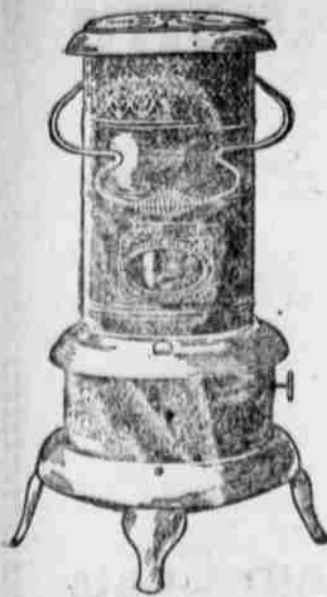


That Cold Room

COKE AND HAMILTON.

(From Corvallis Gazette-Times) (Republican)
The Junction City Times is in favor of the election of Judges Hamilton and Coke. That paper pays a high tribute to Judge Hamilton and says of Coke: "We personally know Mr. Coke to be a clean, able and affable gentleman well worthy of support." Of B. F. Jones, whose ability certainly does not entitle him to the votes of Benton county, the Junction City paper says: "Mr. Jones, one of the republican nominees, was imported from the Portland land office district and installed as Register of the Roseburg land office by Jonathan Bourne, Oregon's distinguished United States senator who advises republicans to vote for a democrat rather than an assembly republican. Mr. Jones is now holding down a government job at \$3,000 per. He is on the republican ticket, mores the pity, but it would be unfair to consider him in the same judicial and forensic worth with Judge Hamilton," or Judge Coke. As the Gazette-Times suggested heretofore—voters should remember that there are two judges to elect. Get the names Hamilton and Coke fixed definitely in the mind and then vote for them. It is important that this be done.—(Paid Adv. by C. F. McKnight.)

VOTE FOR HAMILTON AND COKE

(From Eugene Guard) (Democratic)
The selection of two members of the bench in this district to succeed Judges Hamilton and Coke is an important matter, and should receive careful attention at the hands of the voters. It is conceded that Judge Hamilton will be re-elected, because the people of the counties comprising the second judicial district are not going to dispense with his services so long as he will consent to serve on the bench. He has been faithful and efficient for many years, and is too valuable a jurist to be set aside for political reasons—in fact, practically every newspaper in the district, Republican and Democratic alike, is advocating his re-election.

For the remaining place there are three candidates, Judge Coke, the present incumbent, B. F. Jones, an official of the Roseburg land office, and J. M. Upton, of Marshfield, an independent candidate, who will probably not receive serious consideration at the hands of the voters. The real contest will be between Judge Coke and Mr. Jones, both Republicans, and we should think that the voters should have little trouble in electing the former, a resident of Coos county, as the law requires and a young man of clean personal character and good legal ability. The impression he has made during his service on the bench in the past year has been excellent, and in his home county there was no candidate in the primaries against him. Strictly speaking, Coos County should select this member of the court, since most of his time will be devoted to presiding over the courts of that county.

With Judge Harris, of Lane county, a hold-over member, and Judges Hamilton, of Douglas, and Coke, of Coos county, re-elected at the coming election, the law will be complied with as to residence of the members of the court, and there will be two Republicans and one Democratic judge in the district, with a personnel for integrity and ability not excelled in any district in the state. With the situation thus fully understood, it would seem that the voters should require no urging to mark their ballots for Hamilton and Coke, making no experimental trial of new men who have no special qualifications to recommend them.—(Paid Adv. by C.
