The following telegram has been received at the headquarters of the Dry Campaign Committee: Kansas City, Kan., Oct. 26, 1910.

OREGONIAN ON HOME RULE.

Avowed Whiskey Paper Votes "No Recommendation."

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—The Oregonian votes on the entire ballot and places itself on record in reference to the Home Rule bill as making "no recommendations" as follows:

For Constitutional amendment giving to cities and towns exclusive power to regulate, control, suppress or prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors within the municipality. 328 Yes. 329 No.

This amendment would eliminate gerrymandering on saloon issue and prevent counties forcing prohibitory liquor laws on communities where they cannot be enforced, but is weak in that it makes no distinction between cities and villages. No recommendation. (Pd. advertisement by Rev. Olsen.)

THAT COOS RIVER BOOM.

To Voters: I understand that some unreliable parties are circulating the report that the Port of Coos Bay Commission is responsible for the granting of the privilege of constructing a new boom on Coos River above the cannery. This is absolutely untrue. The permit was given by the United States War Department for the construction of the boom. When it was found that the size of the boom might interfere with Coos River traffic, the Port Commission exerted its influence and had the War Department cut down the size of the boom, thus securing as near as was possible what the Coos River people desired.—(Paid Adv. by Dr. E. MR. TOOZE ON BIBLE BOOZE

Pretends to "Know" His Bible; Claims the Book Commands Booze.

Even though Mr. Tooze said he was responsible to his Maker for everything he uttered last Friday night at the Royal Theatre yet I think the public should weigh his argument (?) that the Bible "commands or commands" the temperate use of alcoholic liquors.

Listen to some of the passages which the speaker gives as "commanding" and "commanding" liquor.

"But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the King's meat, nor with the wine which he drank."... Daniel 1:8.

"For he, (John the fore-runner of Jesus Christ) shall be great in the sight of the Lord, and shall drink neither wine nor strong drink."... Luke 1:15.

"It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor anything whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended or is made weak".... Romans 14:21. "And be not drunk with wine wherein is excess, but be filled with the Spirit".... Ephesians 5:18.

"And they gave Him, (Jesus) to drink, wine mingled with myrrh, but He received it not."... Mark 15:23

Do any of these passages seem to "command" or "command" the use of alcoholic beverages? Then I turn to another reference found on Mr. Tooze's Bible booze sheet marked "Leviticus 28:13" and fail to find it in the Bible at all. (Leviticus only has 27 chapters.)

The Bible is a book which tells of the sins of man. Because of this it does not "command" sin. Because it records the murder of Abel by his brother Cain, it in no way argues that it is in favor of or "commands, much less commands" murder.

Evidently Mr. Tooze has not studied his Bible recently on the question of liquor. If he would only read the Bible verses recorded on his own "booze sheet" and get others to do the same there would be more temperate men walking our streets today.
