COOS COUNTY IS VERY CLOSE ON WET AND DRY QUESTION

Precincts Heard From Give "Wets" Less Than 100 Lead.

COUNTY MAY GIVE WEST MAJORITY

Age and Hall Probably Elected But Other Republicans Win.

OREGON GOES WET.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—Incomplete returns indicate Oregon has gone wet by fair majority.

Whether Coos county is "wet" or "dry" was still in doubt at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The count in the large precincts is now and Central Marshfield will not be completed before midnight tonight.

Probable County Results. Incomplete returns indicate that west will have a majority over Bowerman in Coos County.

Armstrong has defeated Hanly for county commissioner unless Hanly shows unexpected strength in the Coquille valley.

Coroner Golden has probably won over W. E. Dungan although the latter is making a strong race.

PHONE LINE DOWN.

The telephone line between Marshfield and Coquille and Myrtle Point went down shortly after noon today when service will be restored in uncertainty.

LOWER HOUSE TO BE DEMOCRATIC PARTIAL RETURNS INDICATE WEST IS ELECTED GOVERNOR

Republicans Will Have Majority of Forty-two Against Them But Will Control Senate By One, Probably.

HOW CONGRESS STANDS.

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The democrats have elected 221 and the republicans 157 congressmen. The socialists elected one making a total of 391 elected now.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 9.

Sweep of the political tidal wave which rolled over the country is further emphasized by additional returns and revised figures at hand.

Added to the reversal in lower branch of congress in the Republican majority in the United States Senate is rapidly approaching the vanishing point although the republicans are now reasonably assured of 48 sen-

ators or one more than the necessary majority. A number of states are still in doubt.

In Ohio, a democratic legislature was elected assuring a democratic successor to Senator Dick, republican, and the plurality of Governor Harmon is increased to 60,000.

In Indiana the legislature which chooses a successor to Senator Beveridge is in doubt with the democrats claiming a majority of twelve and the republicans are maintaining Beveridge will have a small margin.

Utah legislature which elects United States senator is republican while Montana is in doubt.

In Connecticut, Baldwin, democrat, was elected governor by 35,000.

Iowa is still uncertain, both sides claiming the governorship.

The Pennsylvania legislature is safely republican and will elect a republican successor to Senator Oliver.

Washington has a republican legislature which appears to insure the election of Miles Poindexter to senate.

The Missouri legislature, which elects a United States senator, is believed to be safely democratic.

The plurality of John A. Dix, democrat, for governor in New York, approximates sixty-five thousand. Dix carried the entire democratic ticket with him.

The plurality of Woodrow Wilson, democrat, in New Jersey is placed at thirty thousand.

REPUBLICANS WILL ELECT ALL OTHERS

Partial Returns Also Indicate That Prohibition Is Beaten.

RETURNS VERY SLOW.

PORTLAND, Nov. 9.—In Oregon the returns are coming in very slowly with no indication of how the legislature is going but the state does not elect a senator this time.

The democrats apparently have elected Oswald West for governor by 2,500 to 5,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—Incomplete returns from thirteen counties at noon in Oregon, outside of Multnomah, were:

For congressman, in first district—Hawley, republican incumbent, 2,762; Smith, democrat, 2,087.

For congressman, second district—Lafferty, republican, 2,100; Manning, democrat, 1,202.

For governor—Bowerman, republican, 4,688; West, democrat, 5,404.

For Supreme Judge, six-year term—Burnett, republican, 3,282; Moore, republican and non-partisan, 2,761; King, democrat and non-partisan, 2,516. Burnett and Moore are undoubtedly elected.

For Supreme Judge, (four-year term)—Bean, republican, 3,334; McBride, republican and non-partisan, 2,713; Slater, democrat and non-partisan, 1,752; Bean and McBride are doubtlessly elected.

IN MULTNOMAH COUNTY.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—Sixty-seven precincts out of 182 in Multnomah county and Portland, give Bowerman, for governor, 3,062, and West, 3,013. The democrats still claim the county for West by one thousand. West has a good lead in the state, and there is no doubt of his election.

SOCIALIST IN CONGRESS.
