### THE LATEST OCEAN LINER.

THE WORLD has hardly ceased wondering at the size and speed of its two greatest ocean steamships when word comes of the prospective launching of a new leviathan one-fourth larger than these monsters, with accommodations for 5000 passengers. It is to be equipped with a swimming pool, a roller skating rink, a gymnasium a palm garden and a conservatory, in fact, almost all the modern adjuncts to luxurious living except the garage and the golf links. Of course there are to be electric elevators and an a la carte restaurant a daily newspaper with wireless dispatches and all the other accompaniments of life aloft to which passengers of the high-class vessels have become accustomed. While the gigantic liner will probably be as fast as any now in service, it will not be used for breaking records, the aim being to realize for passengers the greatest amount of comfort rather than speed. The owners say that racing does not pay the cost in coal and labor, easily offsetting the benefit received from the advertising thus secured.

### STEEL STERNWHEELER.

Port of Portland Will Build New Style Towboat.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9. — The first steel sternwheel steamer to ply on the Willamette or Columbia rivers will be built for the Port of Portland Commission to be used in towing big vessels between Portland and the sea and in moving them about in the local harbor.

Bids will be asked about the first of the year. The proposed craft will have a greater length than any of the local towboat fleet and will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The hull will be of steel throughout. The new craft will have a length of 180 feet, beam of

34 feet and a draft of 9 feet. She will have about 1,800 horsepower.

The strongest towboat of the stern-wheel type now in service here is the Harvest Queen with about 1,000 horsepower. It is not expected the proposed craft will be ready to go into commission before the opening of the 1911-1912 grain season.

### LIBRARY GROWING RAPIDLY.

Large Increase In Registration of Patrons of Institution.
