Of necessity and for the reason that we are so well and favorably situated upon the finest harbor in Oregon, Coos Bay was called upon for a division of at least twenty men. With the usual Coos Bay spirit enough of our splendid young men at once offered their services to enable us to have Two Divisions of upwards of Eighty men, or more than four times as many as the officials thought we could furnish.

Already these have met every obstacle presented and have pushed forward with the organizations to such an extent that they have begun drilling and training and have attracted the most favorable com-ment from those familiar with things military on account of the fine showing of the men.

At present there is no appropriation available for the purpose of furnishing uniforms for the men and therefore unless the loyal and patriotic citizens of the Bay get together and purchase these uniforms, the men will either have to purchase them for themselves or else will be compelled to drill and parade in civilian clothes for the next seven or eight months .- a thing which will spoil the appearance of the very best drilled body of men.

Now, these selfsame energetic men are coming forward and in many cases are offering to buy their own uniforms. What is the matter with the rest of us? Where is our pride? Where is our sense of honor and civic decency? Why don't the citizens of Marshfield buy the uniforms for the boys and by so doing show that we are behind such admirable efforts on the part of our boys?
