HILL LINE PLANS.

Stevens Says They Will Expend \$10,000,000 in Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10.—John P. Stevens, chief executive of the Hill steam and electric railway interests in Oregon, has returned to Portland after an extended absence in the East, and announces that the Hill interests will spend from \$7,000,000 to \$10,000,000 in extensions of the United Railways and the Oregon Electric within the next year or 18 months. This will mean an addition of from 200 to 250 miles of electric lines tributary to Portland. It is understood he is able to make this announcement as the result of extended conferences with the Hill officials while he was in the East.

DEATH OF RACHAEL WILSON.

Rachael Wilson was born January 10th, 1854, in Allen County, Ohio. Her mother died when she was three weeks old and her father when she had come to the age of two years. About the time of her father's death she contracted typhoid fever which checked the development of her mind so that she was never more than a child in intellect. Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven. She died November 6, 1910, and was buried the next day from the home of her brother-in-law, Mr. David Fulton.—Coquille Herald.

BANDON PETITIONS PORTLAND.

Wants Better Service Between Coquille and Rose City.

The Portland Telegram says: Bandon, in behalf of the Coquille Valley region, has petitioned the Commercial Club for steamer service between that community and Portland. E. E. Oakes, president of the Bandon Commercial Club, wrote the petition, which was referred to the Chamber of Commerce for such action as the circumstances warrant. President Oakes puts the facts in terse form. He says that the steamer Elizabeth brought from San Francisco 250 tons of freight on her last trip from San Francisco, more than half of which could have been purchased in Portland if the proper steamer connection were had. The three boats, Elizabeth, Fifield and Bandon are plying on that run, carrying good tonnage, and getting the trade of the Bandon and Coquille regions, because of the close transportation connection. There are tons and tons of coal that can be had for from \$3 to \$3.50 a ton delivered on the river, which would sell at from \$10 to \$12 a ton in Portland.
