

HOME RULE BILL CARRIED STATE BY SMALL MAJORITY

State-Wide Prohibition Badly Defeated In Tuesday's Elections.

COOS COUNTY "WETS" HOPE FOR HOME RULE

They Hope to Carry All Present Wet Towns Under New Liquor Law.

CURRY COUNTY WET.

(Special to The Times.) PORT ORFORD, Ore., Nov. 11.—With nearly all of the results of Tuesday's election in, the indications are that Curry county will be "wet" by about fifty. It has been "dry" for some time.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 11.—The "Home Rule" bill has been adopted but the majority will probably be small, considerably less than was early claimed for it. Statewide prohibition was defeated by a big vote. With all but six precincts in Multnomah county, reporting yesterday West carried it for governor by 1,816. Reports from the interior continue to increase West's majority which may run between three and four thousand.

Woman suffrage in Oregon was badly beaten. The proposition to create new counties in several sections of the state were defeated.

NO CHANGE IN COOS.

"Wets" Now Plan to Avail Themselves of "Home Rule" Bill.

The news that the "Home Rule" bill had undoubtedly been adopted in Oregon Tuesday, came as a great consolation to the "wets" in Coos county. That the county went "dry" by twenty-three is practically certain but the official count will not be known until Saturday night or Monday when the official canvass will be completed. The local "wets" now plan to avail themselves of the "Home Rule" bill which will make it possible to have special elections to determine whether the cities go "wet" or "dry." The "wets," judging from Tuesday's results, are reasonably sure of carrying Empire, North Bend, Marshfield and Bandon and have a fighting chance in Coquille. If they are victorious in these places, the number of saloons in the county will remain the same. There has been no change in the other county results.

PARIS IS FLOODED.

River Seine Again On Rampage As Result of Floods.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—The river Seine is again on the rampage. The rapidity of the current has forced a suspension of river traffic. Prolonged rains in Eastern France have swollen the tributaries and caused unusualness in the lower sections. The suburbs of Paris are already slightly flooded.

SETTLE NEW YORK STRIKE.

Terms of Agreement to Be Ratified By New Jersey Men.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—All that is now required to settle the express strike is the ratification of the terms of settlement by the New Jersey section of the striking express companies' employees. The settlement as arranged provides the express companies are to take back the striking employees without discriminating against the men who belong to the Union, that conferences will begin at once between the employees and the companies looking to an agreement on wages and hours. The New Jersey section will vote on the proposition tonight.

AFTER OIL LANDS.

Government Will Try to Recover California Property.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11.—Attorney General Wickersham by the direction of President Taft has begun an inquiry to determine whether six thousand acres of valuable oil lands in California were known to contain oil when patented to the South Pacific. If such was the case a suit to recover will be instituted.

The action regarding the oil lands was taken after conference between Taft and Ballinger, and the attorney general. Thousand of acres of land in California that are known and believed to contain oil, have been patented to individuals and to the Southern Pacific. Those who have heard of the President's action say that if his plans are successful a genuine work for conservation will be accomplished.

MURDER NEAR EVERETT.

Shingle Weaver Mysteriously Slain Sunday Morning.

MURDER IN SPOKANE.

ANTI-AMERICAN OUTBREAKS IN OLD MEXICO GROW SERIOUS

United States Flag Insulted and Property of Citizens Destroyed.

FIVE SHOT BY BOLD ROBBERS

Fierce Battle Follows Attempt to Rob Saloon Near Chicago.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Five persons were shot, two probably fatally, in an attempt early today to rob the saloon of Louis Belmont in the town of Cicero. Three bandits made the attempted robbery and the saloon keeper fired upon them. A battle ensued and one of the burglars was probably fatally shot, and Policeman John Kane was shot five times in the body and probably will die. Miss Millie Collier, a waitress in an adjoining room had her nose shot off. Belmont was hit twice, Fred Cobb, a patron, was hit three times.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11.—To guard against a possible repetition of the anti-American rioting, the government has forbidden the bull fights next Sunday. Quiet prevails. A mob at Guadalupe last night destroyed considerable American owned property. Many rioters were arrested.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11.—Complying with the request of Secretary of State Knox, an inquiry has been instituted by Governor Campbell of Texas into the lynching November 3 of Antonio Rodriguez at Rock Springs, a Mexican, whose lynching precipitated the rioting in the City of Mexico which resulted in insulting the American flag and an assault on Americans. Fifty-one men are now in jail in Mexico City for participation in the riots.

STORY OF RIOTS.

Mexican Students Chief Offenders In Anti-American Outbreak.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 11.—Official dispatches giving details of the anti-American demonstration in Mexico City reached the State Department today from United States Ambassador Wilson and Arnold Franklin, the American Consul General. Wilson confirmed the press reports that he had protested to the Mexican Department of Foreign Relations against the insults offered Americans and the American flag, and said the riot yesterday which resulted in the insult grew out of the lynching of a Mexican, Antonio Rodriguez, at Rock Springs, Texas, November 3. Considerable American property was destroyed and an American flag in front of a candy store was torn down and trampled upon.

Franklin's dispatch said riotous students paraded the streets, carrying a sign "Death to Americans," and threatened the consul general. The department here is awaiting further advices before taking action.

THREE WERE KILLED.

Mexican Censorship Keeps Details of Rioting Secret.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 11.—A report that came from sources considered to be reliable says the attempt made yesterday afternoon was the culmination of an anti-American demonstration that began last night in which two Mexican students and one Mexican onlooker were killed by the police. A further bitter feeling was aroused as a result of these fatalities and more trouble was expected with the break of day. On account of the rigorous censorship, the reports reaching here are meagre.
