### RAISE MONEY FOR UNIFORMS

Marshfield Business Men Contribute Liberally Towards Equipment.

The "Uniform Day" yesterday to equip the two Marshfield Divisions of the Oregon Naval Reserve with uniforms was a big success and the 81 uniforms needed were secured. A. T. Haines and Wm. Grimes made the best showing of the campaign, securing pledges sufficient to defray the cost of forty-three. Henry Sengstacken and R. M. Jennings secured the balance.

It was a whirlwind campaign and nearly everybody seen was ready and willing to help "the boys" along. Instead of asking for various money contributions, the soliciting committees asked for each to furnish one or more suits at a cost of \$8.68 each for the boys and they soon came through.

"We were less than half a day at it," said Chairman Jennings, "and Marshfield should be proud of its showing. I notice in Portland where they are trying to do the same thing, the Chamber of Commerce donated \$25 and they figure it will take a month or so to secure the uniforms needed. We have all ours pledged and will collect the money in a day or two so that the uniforms can be sent for immediately."
