TO OPEN NEW THOROUGHFARE

North Bend, Coos County and Marshfield to Cooperate in Sherman Avenue Project.

County Judge John F. Hall announced yesterday that the Coos County commissioners had unofficially decided to cooperate with the cities of North Bend and Marshfield for opening a new thoroughfare between the two cities.

The plan in brief is to have Sherman avenue completed by North Bend, for Coos county to continue the street the quarter of a mile between North Bend and Marshfield and for the city of Marshfield to open up or rather improve the street direct into the heart of this city.

Much of Sherman avenue has already been completed and the balance can be graded at a comparatively small cost inasmuch as the county will take much of the dirt to be removed and use it in building the street or highway between the two cities.

Just what Marshfield will do is not known but Mayor Straw is said to have approved the plan. The county's portion of the new highway will connect with the present street or roadway near the old brewery. Whether this road will be run direct into Marshfield through a new course or will connect with North Broadway or North Front street will be definitely determined, probably, after a survey of the project has been made.

Judge Hall said that the commissioners decided it would be cheaper for the county to build the new piece of road from Marshfield to North Bend. Some of the old road can probably be used but the balance of it will probably be abandoned soon after the new highway is completed.

The work cannot be done until next spring.

HOME RULE IN NINETY DAYS

bona fide meals and in a legitimate restaurant or grill. To prohibit loafers and vagrants from frequenting in such licensed places.

"To prescribe reasonable hours for the opening and closing in each secular day of all such licensed places. To prohibit licensed places from opening or keeping open or selling intoxicating beverages on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

"The number of licenses now in force in each city of the state in which licenses are now granted shall not be increased until such time as the population of such city shall increase to bear the proportion of one license to each 1,000 of population.

"We believe the public welfare requires that the traffic in intoxicating beverages should be forever divorced from politics; that the holders of licenses should be free from obligations to office-holders and that office-holders should be free from obligation to license holders.

"Take from the common councils of cities and the aldermen composing the same the power to grant licenses. Vest the exclusive power to grant licenses in the judges of the courts of record of the state.

"Make it lawful for any three or more freeholders who are resident voters to file objections to any application for license, either upon the

ground of the improper character of the applicant or the proposed location taking into consideration its proximity to schools or churches, or exclusive residential neighborhoods, as well as the character of the surroundings of each proposed location.

"Reserve to such judges the right to revoke any such license for cause and make any violation of any prescribed regulation cause for revocation.

"Vest in such judges discretion upon first and second convictions to impose fines, the second heavier than the first, but to make a third conviction punishable only by the revocation of the license.

cause the licensee may never obtain another license.

"Provide that any person who has ever been convicted of any crime or offense against the laws of the State of Oregon, above a misdemeanor, shall not be granted a license, nor shall any such license be granted to any person if such judge shall be satisfied that such person shall not conduct the business under such license in an orderly and safe manner."

H. C. McAllister, manager of the Home Rule Association, declared that the association will live up to its plan and will do all in its power to make good, now, that the opportunity has been presented through the voters of the state.
